**EXCITING RUNAWAY.**—A bad runaway occurred yesterday afternoon. A countryman's horse attached to a single seated carriage was standing on Sunnyside in front of Beer & Weeks store, a young lady sitting in the carriage at the time. The owner was carrying out a couple of chairs from the store and was about to place them into the carriage, when an automobile horn suddenly sounded and frightened the horse which bolted. The owner caught the reins and held on as hard as he could while the animal started on a mad gallop, running up over the curb on the side of Queen Square, and going in the direction of St. Paul's Church, smashing both front wheels in the journey. The man put up a splendid effort to bring the frightened animal to a standstill, and held on to the reins for about the length of a block when he tripped over some stones and fell, the rear wheel passing over him. The horse continued on his mad career with the young woman valiantly holding on to the seat and the two remaining rear wheels wobbling in a dangerous fashion. The animal swerved up on the lawn in front of St. Paul's Church where the front axle came in contact with a large tree from which it ripped off about two feet of bark and tore up the soil to quite an extent. This did not stop the animal and he shaped a course for Prince Street via the open stretch of sward between St. Paul's Church and the schoolhouse, and was rounded up on Prince Street in front of the residence of Mr. D.
