ROYAL COMMISSION CONTINUES EVIDENCE

Maritime Grievances are Further Submitted to Sir Andrew Rae Duncan and Commissioners.

Continuation of the evidences, and when these are determined taken before the Royal Commission it should be incumbent upon the (Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, chair-inhabitants to have faith in their own) re Maritime grievances, sit-province and its resources and then being at Charlottetown on Friday our ability to develop them.

MR. W. F. TIDMARSH, the next stand it, you want statutory regulations passed at the annual meeting of the Maritime Canned Fish Section of the Canadian Manufacturers Association, but we do not want socialization endorsing the resolution Orders in Council; we want them made by the Commission at Halifax with reference to statutory regulations covering lobster fishing, political exigencies and interference, also the appointment of a Deputy Minister of Fisheries or a Fisheries Board. He then read an illuminating brief on the fishing industry, urging the Federal Government to assist in the development of its fisheries by the application of scientific research methods.

Mr. Tidmarsh made the following points:

- (1) The utilization of the by-products of fish, now almost universally wasted.
- (2) The continuation by the Federal Government of educational propaganda re the lobster industry.
- (3) The strict enforcement of canning regulations.
- (4) The investigation by the Government of the oyster industry and the establishment of the beds under scientific direction for the purpose of ascertaining the possibility of restoring this fishery.
- (5) The publication by the Federal Government of suitable bulletins.
- (6) Short courses in all fishing localities.
- (7) In the organization of fish hatcheries and in the management of them provision should be made for the training of men in that special branch of the service.
- (8) Winter schools should be started for fishermen with courses for young men in fishing subjects and boat machinery.
- (9) The utilization of men on the sea for the purposes of fishery investigation.
- (10) The outside administrative staff of the fishery service on land should be used for the purposes of investigation as well.
- (11) The service should be speedily and thoroughly re-organized and every official who has no special qualification for his position should be superannuated and replaced by a person of technical or scientific fishery knowledge.
- (12) The appointment of a Deputy Minister of Fisheries for the Maritime Provinces, or the fisheries should be placed under the control of an independent commission composed of capable Maritime men who would take an active interest in the fishery development.
- (13) The appointment of a Commission of experts to investigate the natural resources, marine and bank in three separate crims, in otherwise of the Maritime Provinces in the New York District.

A New Industry

The following is a copy of a letter received by a former Islander in Vancouver, in the mail and is forwarded to the Guardian. The humor in this should be of interest to some "rancher" friends on P. E. I.

99 Rodent Street, Catsburg, Ont. Dear Sir:—Knowing that you are interested always, and open for investment, in good live business propositions, I take the liberty in presenting to you what seems to me to be the most wonderful business and in which, no doubt, you will take a lively interest, and perhaps subscribe to the funds of the society.

The object of this company is to operate a large cat ranch in Northern Ontario where land can be purchased cheaply for the purpose. To start with, we collect about 100,000 cats, each cat with average about 12 kittens a year. The skins run from 10c each for the white ones, to 70c for the pure black ones. This will give us 12,000,000 skins a year, to sell at an average of \$2.00 apiece, making out revenue \$24,000,000 per day gross.

A man can skin 50 cats a day at \$2.00 per day. It will take 100 men to operate this ranch and, therefore, the net profits will be about \$3,800,000 per day.

We will start a rat ranch next door, and feed the cats on the rats. I can multiply four times as fast as the cats. If we start 1,000,000, we will have 4 rats a day for each cat.

And then we will feed the rats on the carcasses of the cats from which we have taken the skins, giving each rat the fourth of the cat. It will thus be seen that the business will be self-supporting and automatic all the way through. The cats will eat the rats, and the rats will eat the cats—and we will

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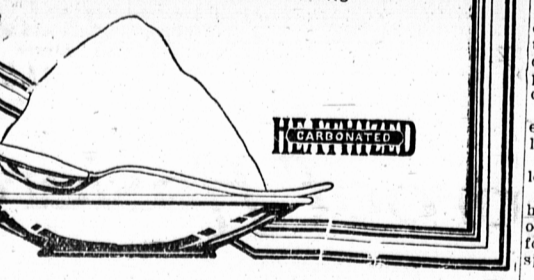
