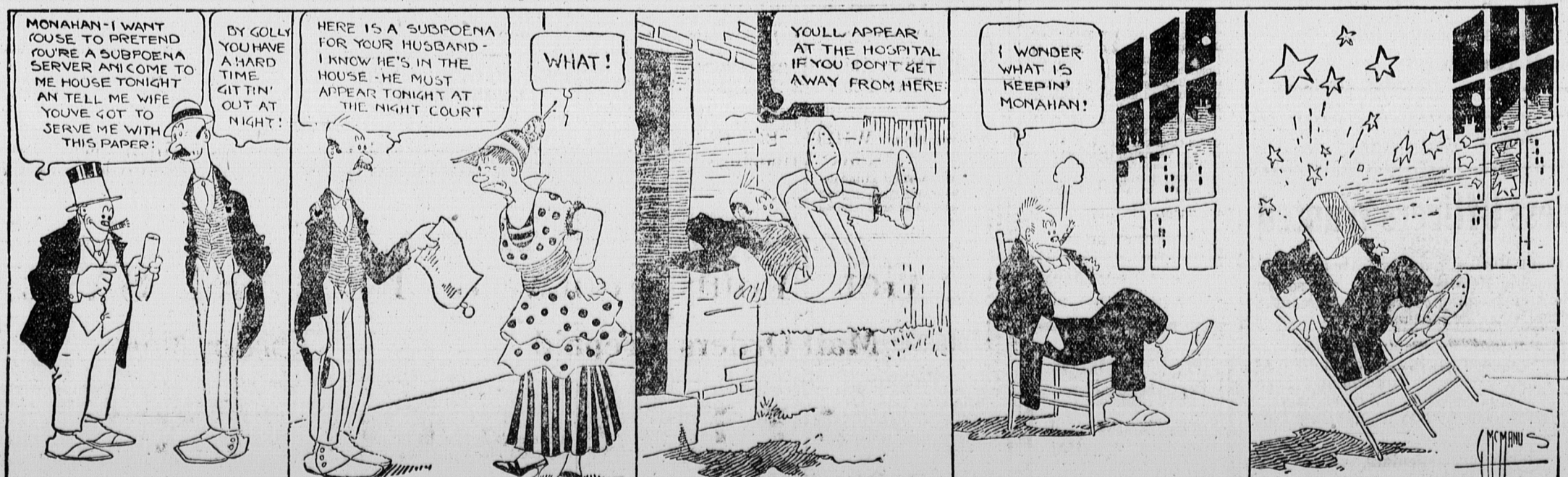

Further Negotiations With Russian Soviet (Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, May 28.—Premier Lloyd George unexpectedly returned to London from the country today and summoned a meeting of the cabinet to discuss the Russian question, following bitter attacks on the Government in newspapers for dealing with Gregory Krassin, Bolshevik Commissioner. The Government officials made every effort to keep Lloyd George's presence secret. It was reported authoritatively that the Premier would have a personal conference with Krassin either today or next week. At this meeting Krassin is to make an offer of peace between England and the Russian Soviets, including new concessions. Vladivostok Government Gone WASHINGTON, May 28.—General Semenov, Siberian Cossack leader, has issued a manifesto declaring that the Provisional Russian Vladivostok Government no longer exists, and that its concessions and other acts are void, the State Department was advised today by the United States Consul at Harbin. Manchuria, Semenov declared he is the successor of Admiral Kolchak and will select an administrative head for far Eastern Siberia.
