H. B. PLANT'S MILLIONS.

His Widow Endeavoring to Overthrow Her Husband's Will.

The trial of the action brought by Mrs. Margaret J. Plant in the supreme court, Manhattan, to overturn the will of her husband, Henry Bradley Plant railroad and steamship magnate, was begun this week before Justice Leventritt, says the Brooklyn Eagle. Mortimer F. Plant, the son of the plaintiff, joins with her in her effort to upset the will although for the purposes of the action he is named as a defendant.

Mr. Plant left an estate of \$10,000,000, and being apparently of the opinion that the great property accumulated by him after he had attained his fiftieth year might be dissipated by his immediate heirs, he had a most peculiar will drawn, with the object of keeping his estate intact for at least sixty years.

His widow and son was left an income of \$30,000 a year each, for which a special fund was created. The residue and accumulations were left to the eldest son of Mortimer F. Plant, who is now 8 years old and he is not to receive the fortune until his youngest son is of age. The Plant millions are thus left in reality to a great-grand-son of the testator, and he cannot receive a cent of the property until his youngest brother or sister has reached majority. The estate will it is estimated, by that time be worth \$100,000,000.

THE WILL WAS PROBATED

in New Haven, Conn., where the Plants had a summer home, and that state was claimed by the testator as his legal residence. Had the will been filed in New York it would unquestionably have been held to be invalid, as the law in that state expressly declares that no trust shall be created for "more than two lives in being." This prevents a testator from leaving his property to unborn but presumable heirs.

The will was drawn by Joseph Lynde Harrison, of New Haven, who is named as one of the trustees, and it is valid according to Connecticut law. Mr. Harrison is named as one of the defendants by Mrs. Plant, as are also the other trustees, her son, Mortimer Freeman Plant, George L. Tilley and Robert G. Erwin.

Mrs. Plant asks that a receiver be appointed for certain property by the

New York courts, and that the courts here take entire charge of the estate. She prays that the will and conditions be upheld only as far as they are consistent with the laws of this state, and that the defendants be directed to bring back into the jurisdiction of the New York courts all securities and property removed to Connecticut. She further asks that all proceedings taken there in view of the probate of the will be declared null and void.

Mrs. Plant claims that her husband shortly before his death went to Connecticut and claimed a residence there with fraudulent intent having a desire to circumvent and evade the laws of New York, of which state he had been a resident for many years.

Mr. Plant died at his residence here, 536 Fifth Avenue, on June 23, 1890. The trust codicil was only signed

THREE DAYS BEFORE HIS DEATH

Mrs. Plant alleges that after the funeral, Judge Harrison and Mr. Erwin, who were her husband's Southern lawyers, came here, took the will away from the safe with certain securities and removed them to New Haven.

Should the will be probated in New York, Mrs. Plant could claim her dower right in the estate, which, now, according to William D. Guthrie, counsel for Mrs. Plant, is valued at \$20,000,000, of which she would be entitled to nearly \$7,000,000. The defendants contend that the New York State courts have no jurisdiction and that the suit, should have been brought in the United States courts.

When the case was called in court this morning William D. Guthrie, the plaintiff's attorney, explained how Mr. Plant, went to his country home at Branford, Conn; and about his illness there. Thence he started for New York, Mr. Guthrie said, stopping in New Haven, on the way. A few days later he died at his home in New York.

"Before leaving New Haven," said Mr. Guthrie, "he left a will with his confidential attorney there. Never before, however, or from then until his death, had he given any one the slightest intimation that he expected to remove his domicile from New York to Connecticut.

"WHEN MRS. PLANT APPEARED before the judges in New Haven, she learned for the first time that Mr. Plant had been made a resident there, and she was assured by her lawyer that the papers she signed in that city did not in any way prejudice her rights. When Mrs. Plant asserted her intention of trying to secure the share of the property allowed her by the New York laws, instead of the annual income provided by the Connecticut will, her lawyer at first attempted to confine her to a counsel of his own selection, whom he offered to pay out of the estate.

Maxwell Everts followed Mr. Guthrie presenting the case for the defence. He began by saying that whatever testimony might be brought forward by the plaintiff it would be necessary to dismiss the case, because the decree of a sister state could not be set aside and the judgement of the probate court there must stand until it was appealed or reversed.

"There is not the slightest proof" said he, "of fraud in connection with the will but if there was such you must go to the courts of the state, where the judgement was given for relief. My friends tell you, that the judgement must be set aside because the court of Connecticut did not have jurisdiction. Now, the plaintiff invoked the assistance of the courts there, so they had jurisdiction of the parties. Equally true they had jurisdiction of the subject matter, for the court had general jurisdiction of that kind of cases, and that's all it amounts to."
