Finally they drove away and as they left threw a bottle through the window of Anderson's house. The "lady" was swearing as the party drove off. The disturbances came back to Anderson's house about midnight, and brought others with them. They tried to break into the house. Thomas Collings, a friend of the Andersons had remained with them since the afternoon, and he went out into the yard on the occasion of the second visit. Here he found the assailants armed with sticks, and Collings was struck on the head with a stick in which was a nail, the latter inflicting a nasty wound. After this they went away for an hour and when they came back again about one o'clock, Anderson says he fired a blank cartridge from his gun to frighten them. Although it appeared to have been a most disgraceful case of rascally rowdiness, both the prisoners confessed that they were drunk and one complained that he had been struck by Collings, who was using a potato pounder for a weapon. This Collings denies. Anyway Currie presented a pretty well pounded appearance in court yesterday, having black eyes and a bruised countenance. A fine of \$5 and costs was imposed on each prisoner and they were ordered to pay the cost of the damage done to Anderson's property. Otherwise they could go to jail for a month. Currie went to jail; Mahar will pay the fine. The Magistrate warned the prisoners that if they ever come before him again they will get all the punishment in his power to give them.

Deceased was the fourth son of the late Robert and Elizabeth Fraser, and was born March 7th 1874. He had been employed with Davis & Fraser, Charlottetown for about two months previous to April 27th when that date he returned home. The evening of his arrival he was taken ill. The case was diagnosed appendicitis. He was taken to the P. E. Island Hospital in the hope that an operation would be successful. Pneumonia developed and the crisis came on the 14th inst at 9.15 p. m. surrounded by three of those he loved his spirit went to meet the God who gave it. He has left to mourn a widowed mother, four brothers, and two sisters, besides a large number of friends and acquaintances as it was possible for anyone to make in a short life of thirty two years. A number of years ago he united with the East Point Baptist Church and while loyal and true to the church of his choice he had deep respect for the principles and views of other peoples. For a time he very acceptably filled the position of Supr. of the North Lake Sunday School. In the autumn of 1898 a Lodge of the I. O. G. T. was organized at North Lake. He was one of the charter members and since that time has taken a deep interest in temperance work; nothing being too difficult for him to do in order to make the lodge and the cause successful. Six months ago he accepted a request from the Grand Lodge to undertake organization work. Where others failed he succeeded and today twenty Lodges with a membership of over seven hundred stand as a monument to his ability and love of the cause of total abstinence. Endowed by nature with a ready wit his hearty laugh and cheerful smile easily made him a favorite wherever he went. Fluent of speech with a mind well stocked with knowledge he was a forceful and pleasing platform speaker. His funeral took place from his boyhood home on Wednesday evening and one of the largest processions ever seen in these parts bore eloquent tribute to the respect and esteem in which he was held. The funeral service at the house was conducted by Rev. J. H. Gardner. At the grave the I. O. G. T. ceremony was read and then, as the shadows of evening were falling we laid away all that was mortal of our beloved friend and brother, sorrowing not because we had no hope, but like the disciples of old because we shall see his face on earth no more. 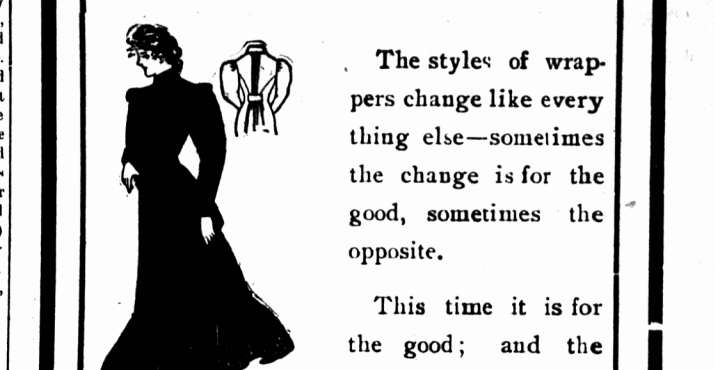
