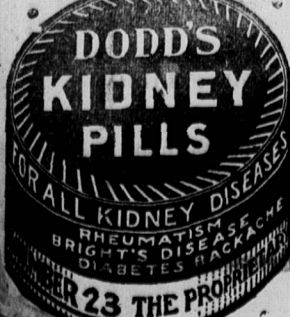
MEN WHO KEEP YOUNG

SANTA ROSA, Cal., March 9.—Luther Burbank, the horticulturist, 71 years old, yesterday said he was too busy in his garden to celebrate the event. Since long before the day of Ponce de Leon people have been searching for the secret of extended youth. Some of those who have searched have found it but a good many wise men have found it without, searching. They didn't travel beyond the sphere of their normal life to find it either, and it is open to nearly every one who is capable of grasping it. The one thing, apart from sane and healthy living, that has kept men young in body and in spirit,

while they have grown old in years is sustained interest in agreeable employment. Among the world's prominent men there are many conspicuous examples of the efficiency of this only preventive of age, but there are men in almost any urban community who have discovered and are employing the secret. Luther Burbank, among his flowers and vegetables and fruit trees, is 71 years old, but he is too busy and interested in what he is doing to mark the passage of his years. And so the years mark his body and spirit but lightly. At 71 he is capable of and probably is enjoying life as keenly as at 41 or 51, because he is constantly interested in his work. He keeps it interesting by never resting on the laurels of any one accomplishment, however brilliant; but passing on to something else, aiming at something more.

At 71 many men are old both in spirit and body. Some are old at 61 even at 51. And those who are oldest are in the main, those who have taken the most perfunctory interest in their work in life—so little interest that they have been ready to welcome the excuse of advancing years to abandon it permanently. Perhaps the majority of men are doing nothing at the age of 71 because before reaching that age they concluded that they were old enough to retire. They sit in the sun or by the fireside thinking of the passing of time. Long before 71 many men, who unlike Luther Burbank, do celebrate their birthdays, have concluded they are too old for farther labor. Whereas they would not have so concluded had they been engrossed in their work.

Burbank is only one of a number of men, says an exchange whose birthdays are annually mentioned in the newspapers and thereby interest the world in general more than the men themselves because of the fact that at their age they are still "going strong". Edison, who was planning new inventions on his 73rd birthday last month, is another. Burroughs, at the age of 83 is as keen a naturalist as ever. Rockefeller is 81. Carnegie was 84 when he died. England has a number of prominent men active in political, scientific, or other affairs although in advanced years. The most notable perhaps, is Lord Halsbury, who at the age of 95 has not abandoned his life-long interests.

25 YEARS AGO.—The Moncton Times reports the retail prices which prevailed there 25 years ago. It makes interesting reading, as follows: Butter, 18 to 20 cents; beef, 5 to 6 1/2; beef hides, 3 to 3 1/2 cents; spring chicken, 50 to 60 cents; turkey, lb. 14 to 15; eggs dozen, 15 to 25; lamb, lb. 7 to 8 cents; lambkins, 40 to 50 cents; oats, bushel, 40 to 45 cents; potatoes, bushel, 40 to 50; pork, carcass, 7 to 7 1/2; turkeys, bushel, 30; apples, barrel, \$1.50 to \$2.50; oysters, barrel, \$3.00 to \$5.00; rabbits, 10 to 15; geese, 60 to 80 cents; ducks, pair, 60 to 90; smelts, lb. 3 cents; bear skins, \$30; other furs \$15; milk, 25 to \$1.25; mutton, 25 to \$1.75; muskrat, 5 to 10 cents.

CONVICTION SECURED.—The case against John Gillis, charged with importing liquor from the Province of Quebec was concluded Saturday morning when judgment was given, convicting the defendant who was fined under the Doherty Act, \$100 or two months imprisonment. This is the first case of the kind in which there has been a conviction in this Province. Mr. D. McLaughlin appeared for the defendant and argued that the Act only applied to the exporter and even if the Act did apply in this case the evidence was not strong enough to base a conviction. His Honor held that if the Doherty Act did not apply in this case it served no useful purpose. The intention was to assist such Provinces where the sale or keeping of liquor was illegal. In this Province the sale or keeping of liquor is illegal except under the clearly defined regulations of the Prohibition Act.

CANADA AND UNITED STATES GET TOGETHER IN AGREEMENT

Fear Trawler Lost With All On Board

HALIFAX, March 13.—The passing of another day has failed to solve the mystery surrounding the Nova Scotia trawler, the Lemberg, which disappeared on the night of the 22nd. During the past twenty-four hours no word has been received regarding her whereabouts, and it is feared that she met her fate on the Banks. Yesterday the trawler Lemberg owned by the National Fish Company, returned to port bringing the body of Mate Ellison, which was picked up in one of the dories. Medical Examiner Finn held an autopsy last night and found that death was caused by exposure.

Found Body in Dory.

That the Jutland, Captain Johnson came to grief during Wednesday night is the opinion of Captain Hansen and the crew of the Lemberg. Leaving here Wednesday evening for the Banks, the Lemberg arrived on the Banks, at nine o'clock on Thursday morning and found a floating dory it was badly smashed and full of water. About a mile distant another dory was picked up and in this was the body of Mate Ellison.

The dory was full of water, and the body was floating with the face down. Near one end the side plank was broken. There were no seats or oars, and the painter was out. Ellison's body was taken on board and a member of the crew of the Lemberg recognized the man as being his chum for many years. Ellison was dressed in oil skins and wore a "sou'wester". There were no marks about the face.

Various theories were expressed along the waterfront yesterday, as to the fate of the Jutland. Two weeks ago she put into this port with her steering gear slightly disabled, and left for the Banks again several days later. When she cleared at the Custom House on Monday afternoon, March 1st, she carried a total crew of 21 men.

NAVAL OFFICER HELD AS SUSPECT

LONDON, March 12.—The latest suspect held in Dublin Castle is Lt. Commander Erskine Childers, whose home was raided by soldiers Tuesday, according to the Daily Mail's Dublin correspondent. Childers is a commander in the naval reserve and a son of the former Chancellor of the Exchequer. He gave notable service with the air force during the war, and, according to the newspaper, the people of Dublin are puzzled over the purpose of the search of his home. He is the author of a book on Home Rule for Ireland.

SHIPPING NEWS

STEAMER ROYAL GEORGE SAILS FROM HALIFAX

Two days from New York, the Cunard liner Royal George, Captain W. Prothro, arrived in Halifax, yesterday, and docked at Pier Two. After taking on about 210 passengers, 84 members of the crew of the wrecked steamer Bohemian, and two cars of mail matter she sailed Saturday morning for Plymouth, Havre and Southampton.

As the Royal George was entering her dock at New York on her arrival last week from Halifax, she brushed up against the Imperator, a liner of the same company, and the forward starboard side of one of her decks. At the American port she took on 153 Salomon, 95 Cabin and 190 third class passengers. Among those on board is Lady Katharine Howard, who passed through Halifax last year.

On the Royal George is a party of the American Red Cross Society. It consists of nine doctors and 13 nurses, and is bound to Warsaw, France, Switzerland and Vienna to their destination. The majority of the doctors saw overseas service in the war, and ten of the nurses also served on the other side of the Atlantic. Several of them only recently returned from Siberia, and in making the trip to Warsaw are practically circling the Globe.

SCHOONER BOUND TO ST. JOHN OVERDUE

The three masted schooner Thomas H. White is two months overdue on a passage from Perth Amboy to St. John, laden with coal. The schooner, in command of Captain O. Clarke, and carrying a crew of six men, left Perth Amboy December 6th, and sailed from Vineyard Haven December 22nd. Since that time no tidings have been received from her.

LIVERPOOL MAN ABOARD

The wireless from the Banks reporting the finding of two dories and the body of the mate of the beam trawler Jutland, has occasioned much uneasiness in Liverpool. N. S. The following men from Liverpool formed part of the crew: John McDonald, cook; Allen Jollimore and his son John, Fred Selig and Frank Pitts; also John Wolf, of Western Head and Richard Young, of Shelburne. These are all that are known at present and it is possible that others from Liverpool are also on board.

LONDON, March 11.—In the House of Commons tonight Sir Hamar Greenwood said that the government had no objection to admitting the Russian co-operative delegation into England for trade, but that Livinoff, on account of his record here, was forbidden to enter the country. The House discussed and after much criticism passed the Air Force estimates.

FOR NICKEL COINAGE

TORONTO, March 11.—The Canadian Mining Institute at the last session of the convention here today went on record as being unanimously in favor of nickel coinage and recommending its circulation at an early date. The resolution was adopted after C. R. MacDonald, of the International Nickel Company, had given an interesting paper on the advantages of nickel coinage. Canada produced, said Mr. MacDonald, eighty per cent of the world's nickel. The officers for the coming year include: President, O. E. S. Whitehead, Coleman, Alberta; vice-presidents Nova Scotia, G. D. McDougall, New Glasgow.

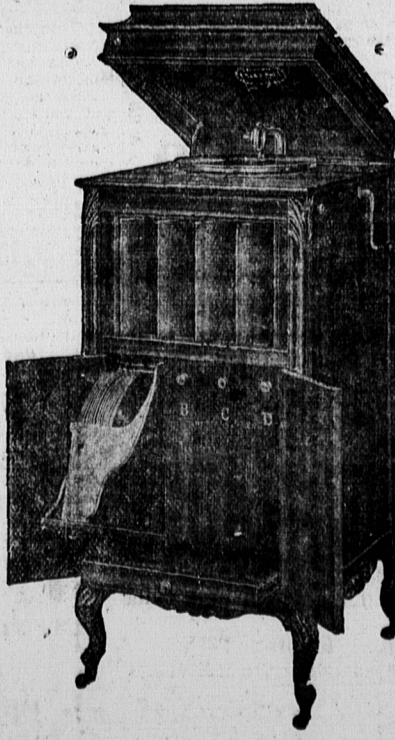
GIRL CONFESSES TO KILLING HER SISTER
