BUSY WEEK FOR PUPILS—Examination week has rolled around for more than a thousand pupils in the public schools of this province. The annual entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College for Grade ten and two examinations of the Common Examinations Board of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland for Grades eleven and twelve will be written this week. The latter will be held at Summerside, Montserrat and Kinkora. This is the first year for Grade eleven at Kinkora. Pupils of 100 will try the Entrance Examinations on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at Charlottetown, Summerside, Montserrat and Kinkora. In addition to this about 400 Grade nine pupils, for the first time this year, will write of three subjects—Canadian History, Geography and English.

CONCLUDE COURSE—The Operators Class of No. 6 Dist. Signals concluded their examinations for Class II operator certificates Friday night. The examinations which began last Monday comprised electricity, procedure, electrical apparatus of all kinds, wireless and radio. In addition to the candidates were individually tested on the operation and adjustment of all signalling equipment now employed. Morse was also taken both in cipher and plain language at 17 1-2-20 words a minute with line interference. The candidates were also required to send, register and prepare for transmission a number of messages within a time limit, as well as to send and receive by lamp and flag. The examinations, set by Signal Headquarters, Barrickville, Ont., were in charge of Major W. A. Smith, D.S.O., M.D., No. 6 and S. M. I. Sloane, I.C.R.C. Signals. The course comprising both Class III and II began in January and was given by S. M. A. D. MacMaster, I.C.R.C. Signals.

Ben Hogan Crashes Way To Dramatic Victory In Hale America Tournament

CHICAGO, June 21—(AP)—Tiny Ben Hogan, Henry, Pa., pro, never before winner of a major golf tournament, crashed to a dramatic victory in the Hale America United States Open today with a 72-hole total of 271, 17 under par for the distance. Hogan finished three strokes ahead of challenging Jimmy Demaret of Detroit and Mike Turnesa, White Plains, N.Y., who tied for second with 274. The 29-year-old Texan, starting today's final 18-hole round tied with Turnesa at 273, stood off Demaret's late challenge by playing steady, superb golf. Demaret led Hogan by two strokes at the end of 68 holes, but Hogan, refusing to blow up under pressure, picked five strokes on the next four holes. Hogan climaxed his game by sinking a 25-foot putt for a birdie two on the 18th to the accompaniment of cheers from a crowd of 8,000 clustered 10 deep.

NEW YORK, June 21—(AP)—New York Yankees snapped their five-game losing streak today as Hank Borowy shut out Cleveland Indians 4-0 in the nightcap of an American League double-header at Cleveland before a local season record of 44,278.

NEW YORK, June 21—(AP)—Cliff Melton shut out Chicago Cubs on four hits in pitching New York Giants to a 5-0 victory in the first game of a National League doubleheader today, but the Cubs took the second game 7-2 with homers by Stan Hack and Dom DiMascandro accounting for six runs. Johnny Mize hit a home run for the Giants in extra game, running his total for the season to 11, and each four-bagger caught Mel Ott on base. At Brooklyn, Mori Cooper stopped Brooklyn Dodgers cold, but his 11-0 shutout in the top half of a doubleheader was the only contest St. Louis Cardinals could salvage from a five-game series. The Dodgers bounced back to take the finale 5-2 and maintain their 7 1-2-game lead over the Cards in the National League.
