THE NORTHUMBERLAND.—The S. S. Northumberland arrived in Charlottetown at 5.20 last evening.

FUNERAL TODAY.—The funeral of the late Miss Doherty will leave her brothers residence at St. Avard's today, Wednesday, at 2.30 p. m., for the People's Cemetery.

MONTHLY MEETING.—The regular monthly meeting of the Ladies Aid Society of the P. E. I. Hospital was held in the hospital yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The work of the past month indicates continued activity and usefulness on the part of this most charitable institution.

FUNERAL FRIDAY.—The funeral of the late Rev. S. D. McFhee took place last Friday from the residence of his brother in law, Mr. James A. Nicholson, Orwell Cove. The services at the house were conducted by Rev. D. B. MacLeod assisted by Rev. J. W. MacKenzie. The remains were taken to St. John's Church, Belfast, where the main service was held, when Rev. Mr. MacKenzie, the pastor presided. Rev. Mr. MacLeod paid an eloquent tribute to the memory of the deceased, as a man, a friend, a christian and a minister. Short address dresses emphasizing the work and worth of the deceased were given by Rev. Mr. MacKenzie and Rev. Mr. MacNeill. The services were closed with the benediction by Rev. John Gillis of Wood Islands. A large congregation, filling the auditorium of the church, viewed for the last time all that was mortal of a former beloved pastor and friend after which the remains were consigned to their last resting place, in the beautiful Belfast cemetery.

INTERESTING LECTURE.—It is not every day that citizens are given the opportunity of hearing an educational lecture such as the one which Rev. Mr. Marshall, of the Grace Methodist Church, gave last evening. Quite a large audience were in the church and their appreciative attitude inspired the reverend speaker to a fine effort. The subject of the lecture was "Japan," and in connection with it, eighty large stereopticon views were shown embracing the conditions in Japan in the past and those that are supreme to-day. Mr. Walter Burke operated the lantern. The lecture dealt with the geography of the country, described the government and its effect on the advancement of this oriental nation; the features of educational work, the military outlook, and last but by no means least, the splendid missionary work that is being performed there. At the close of the lecture a vote of thanks was proposed and was tendered the speaker by the chairman, Mr. Seaman. Mr. Marshall suitably replied to it. The lecture last evening was only the forerunner of a series that are to be given in the church by some of the leading speakers of the city, and to which citizens will look forward with great pleasure.

PREPARING FOR LAST ROUND IN HOME RULE GO.
LONDON, Nov. 3.—Another week of exceptional interest in Irish politics has begun. It will be marked by several speeches of importance, and will close with the Reading election. Liberals both there and at the party headquarters in London betray the utmost anxiety, as to the result.

This evening Arthur J. Balfour opens the Scottish campaign against Home Rule at Aberdeen. By common consent he was the greatest Chief Secretary for Ireland of the last half century, and he possesses the historical sense, more than any living statesman. Special significance also attaches to the meeting of Ulster business men at Belfast tomorrow, at which Sir Edward Carson will speak. All the chief towns and districts of Ulster will be represented, but only by actual employers of labor. Austen Chamberlain speaks tomorrow at Llanelli, and F. E. Smith at Stafford.

Nearly all the Cabinet ministers will assemble in London this week, and the opportunity is therefore ripe for that free and frank interchange of views of the Irish situation invited by Premier Asquith and commended by Mr. Bonar Law.

That any definite developments will take place immediately, however, is extremely doubtful, though it is known that the King is most anxious to announce a settlement of the Ulster crisis when he reads his speech from the throne, at the opening of the next session of parliament.

The Government's attitude on the subject was most accurately defined in Sir Edward Grey's recent speech, in which he outlined a scheme of Home Rule within Home Rule by which a number of public services, including education, might be reserved to the separate control of Ulster. With this Mr. Redmond is in agreement, but Sir Edward Carson will not consent to any form of Government for Ulster that would leave supreme control with the Nationalist party.

INTERESTING APPEAL.—One of the matters to come before the Supreme Court of Canada at Ottawa this week is an interesting and important appeal from the Supreme Court of this province, Daniel R. Morrison v. The Summerside Water and Sewerage Commissioners. This litigation has been drawn out over some years. It started with a bill in Chancery by Mr. Morrison, against the Commissioners in which he claimed certain money to be owing to him under his contract with the commissioners for the installation of the water and sewerage system of Summerside. The case was heard before the Vice Chancellor and was dismissed. The complainant took the case to the Court of Appeal and Equity, which dismissed the appeal, confirming the decision of the Vice Chancellor. Mr. Morrison has carried his appeal now, to the Supreme Court of Canada. The appellant is represented by Mr. A. C. Saunders, and the respondents by Mr. Neil McQuarrie, K. C.

JAPANESE ANTIQUES
SOLD AT KYOTO
KYOTO, Japan, Nov. 4.—Collectors deals and agent and agents representing many leading museums in all parts of the civilized world are gathering here to attend one of the most remarkable if not the most remarkable sale of Japanese antiques ever held in this country. This sale, which is to be held with the sanction of the Imperial Government has an interesting history. The great temple of Kyoto, being heavily in debt and unable to raise funds among the worshippers, found it necessary to resort to desperate means. The temple authorities appealed to the Imperial Government and obtained permission to sell part of the famous temple treasure, consisting of priceless paintings, ceramics, bronzes and ivories, art work in various metals, wood carving, jades, tapestries and silks, many of them of great antiquity and rarity. Probably never before has there been such an opportunity for collectors to acquire Japanese antiques of undoubted genuineness. It is understood that the Imperial Government will be represented at the sale, which is to continue through the entire month, by expert commissioners who will see to it that the most valuable and important objects are sold to the Government, so as to keep them in the country.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN MCKINNON.

The funeral of the late Mr. John McKinnon of Whim Road Cross took place on Wednesday, the 29th Oct. With the passing away of Mr. McKinnon goes one of the land marks of the district. He was a man of keen intellect, of upright and sterling character, honest in all his dealings and respected by all who knew him. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. David Wright of St. Andrew's Church, Montague. There was a very large attendance at the funeral and many teams accompanied the remains to the cemetery at Valleyfield. Mr. McKinnon's illness began about a year ago when he was stricken down with paralysis. He rallied and was able to walk about the house with the help of his recovery; but a few weeks ago he caught cold and developed pneumonia. The end came on Sabbath morning, Oct. 26th. He was predeceased by his wife. He leaves four children:—Dr. Malcolm C., Catherine, Sadie and Mary. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved.

MR. ABRAHAM BUOTE.
The death occurred at Charlottetown, on Friday, Oct. 31, 1913, of Abraham Buote, aged 50, after illness of about ten months. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon to St. Ann's Church Cemetery. Rev. Father Gaudet officiating. A wide circle of relatives and friends were present to pay a last tribute of respect to their deceased neighbor. Besides a sorrowing widow seven children are left to mourn:—Eniot, Avit and Judith in St. John, N. B.; Sarah, Theopelus, Joseph and Charlotte. Ann in Hope River. The late Mr. Buote was an intelligent farmer, highly interested in the welfare of his home district, being road master for years, a Justice of the Peace, and was secretary for three or four years for the New Glasgow Dairying Company and was highly respected and loved by his friends.
