In the last heat of the 224 trot on Friday the mare driven by R Steele went lame a few yards from the wire. It was thought to be nothing more than a sprain and the left hind leg was bathed and bandaged. On Saturday morning however it was found to be broken just above the knee. Dr Leekie did all that was possible during the day but by evening it was seen that the animal would have to be destroyed. It is thought the accident was caused by stepping on a pebble or in a small hole. Princess Regent was seven years old and thought she had little training showed great speed. She was of the best breeding and bought four years ago in Boston by Mr Prowse who has sustained a big loss by the death of so valuable an animal.
