THE EVENT OF THE SEASON

Original Dumbells In "Rapid Fire."

The appearance here March 26 and 27 at the Prince Edward theatre of the world famous Originals, Canada's brilliant company of Solo-ler funmakers, will be greeted by Charlottetown theatregoers as one of the outstanding events of the present season. Mr. Pearson possesses a marvellous natural Soprano voice as surprising and delightful as his, his appearance, he has created a sensation already in every city he has appeared with the Originals, and local theatregoers are eagerly awaiting his appearance in Charlottetown. Jimmie Goode, a former Charlottetown boy is one of the stars of the show, while Canada's best known comedian, "Red" Newman, has a masterpiece in "The Stoker," representing a scene in the hold of a battleship, this number is particularly fine. Probably the best hits of all Red's scores, however, are two Coster numbers, one Albert Chevalier's famous "Knocked 'em in the Old Kent Road"; Arthur (Jock) Holland, the "Girl" with the naughty eyes has some marvellous costumes which he brought from London and Paris this summer. Of particular note is the Russian Court scene in which he is assisted by ten of the chorus as Courtiers. Here is where the audience gets its first glimpse of the famous Jewelled Curtain which was imported from Paris at tremendous expense for the new production: Alan Murray who directs the dances and is responsible for the arrangements, is seen at his very best while Charlie McLaren as a type of character comedian entirely different from the others first in a skit with Red Newman called "Dirty Work" and later with Jimmie Goode in an old fashioned Cake walk, has some remarkably fine character work; Tom Young, Bill Tennent, Bertram Langley and Jerry Brayford present a magnificent "East Indian number" wherein they represent four Hindu Rastafas in the Indian Love Lyrics—Temple Bells, Kashmiri Song, and Less Than The Dust; Gene Pearson appears first in Carmina, and later in an old Song Book number sung by Tom Young, appears from the large album and sings "The Last Rose of Summer"; Fred Fenwick and Jimmie Goode have a refreshing skit—a hotel scene—as genuine team as anything this clever team has offered us; Ted Charter is "Sermonizing" and Bob Anderson are two comedians of excellent entertaining qualities and their stuff goes over with a bang.

The production is under the personal direction of Leonard Young, who for the past year and a half has been away from the Company directing Montreal's Community Players and the touch of his hand can be seen in every number of the present revue. Several of the Lyrics have been written by Bertram Langley and some by Charlie McLaren, Alan Murray and Jack McLaren. The musical numbers were specially arranged by Mr. Young and Jack Ayre, the latter the company's musical Director who holds the record of never having missed his place at the piano since the first performance of the Originals behind the lines in 1916.
