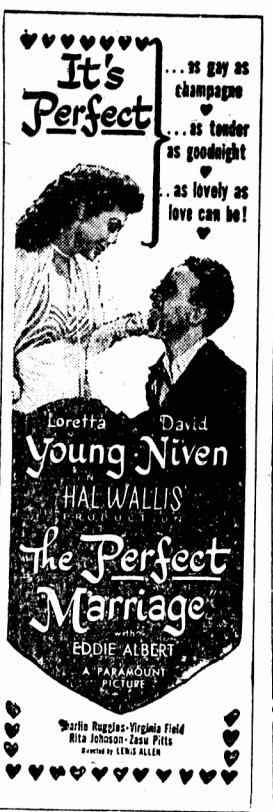

X-Ray Survey Starts Today In Summerside

The second Mass Chest X-Ray Survey of Summerside begins today at the Armouries at 10 A.M. and will continue until November 28th, except for Saturdays. The Tuberculosis League strongly advises every adult and all teen age children who were done two years ago to have another chest X-Ray examination at this time. X-Raying is now done through the clothing, and every person as he leaves is given a slip of paper showing his X-Ray serial number and the date on which it was taken. These slips should be saved for reference. The Summerside Y's Men's Club have been responsible for arrangements for this survey. Registration will be carried out by members of the I. O. O. F. E. and the Catholic Women's League who have volunteered for this work.

The first survey of Summerside was completed almost two years ago in February, 1946, and quite a number of persons in Summerside and vicinity have present excellent health prospects because of the early treatment which was made possible by the timely discovery of Tuberculosis at that time. A chest X-ray examination for everybody, especially all adults is strongly advocated by the Tuberculosis League. A representative of the League stated that there are undoubtedly a number of new cases among persons in Summerside who were free from disease two years ago. If every such case is found and treated at the beginning they will have the best possible chance for recovery. If continued this program over a period of years is expected to save the lives of many patients and will also materially reduce the spread of infection.

The Y's Men's committee are to be congratulated on securing such a central location for the unit. For permission to use the Armouries they are indebted to Captain McNeill. It would not have been possible to use this location without the active assistance of the Electric Light Company. They have, under Mr. Hacker's direction, run a special power line and mounted a transformer capable of supplying a heavy current at 220 volts to the Armouries as their free contribution to this survey.

Hitler Chancellery Dark, Dreary Ruin

(By Eric Bourne) BERLIN, Oct. 29 - (Reuters) - Soviet army and German police guards have been withdrawn from the miserable rain and wind-faunted ruins of Hitler's former "Reichskanzlei" on the Wilhelmstrasse, and Germans now are venturing, with half-timid curiosity, into the building in any numbers for the first time.

Elderly couples, arm-in-arm, peer with scarce concealed awe at the towering walls and lofty ceilings stripped now of their rich mosaics and panellings and their massive, elaborate chandeliers. It is a "hangover" of awe lingering from former days or awe at the depths of their fuhrer's fall? If you ask them, they shrug their shoulders and murmur, "terrible, terrible," and shuffle on.

A gang of laborers still is working in the chancellery, removing what little is left of the precious marbles, metals and other building materials considered to be of use for reconstruction elsewhere. When their task is done, the whole building is scheduled for demolition.

Out in the chancellery gardens, weeds abound near the entrance to the air raid shelter, covering the tiny depression in which the bodies of Hitler and Eva Braun, wrapped in gasoline-soaked blankets, are supposed to have been burned after their deaths. Best informed guide in the chancellery is an old man who worked there for two years under the broad reception hall where Hitler

Polish Legation Gives Explanation Re Girl Immigrants

OTTAWA, Oct. 29 - (CP) - A diplomatic furore over alleged Polish interference with girl immigrants has resulted in the Polish Legation here denying responsibility but warning its staff against recurrence of a recent incident, the External Affairs Department said today.

The Legation, according to the Department, said a "misunderstanding" had resulted in the allegation that a Legation employee had recruited two Polish girl immigrants here for work on a Polish-language Communist newspaper in Toronto.

Hitler's Bath Gone

From Hitler's former private suite, behind Bismarck's one-time chancellery, everything that escaped destruction in the war has been looted or dismantled. The safes—18 in the past year, the aid man said—the heating system, even the lavatories and Hitler's special bath, all have been removed.

Yet, scattered everywhere over three spacious, lofty apartments, there still is a profusion of blank sheets of notepaper headed "Reichskanzlei", various forms, index cards, proposals for promotions and the filled-in pleas for Hitler's clemency by the wives and mothers of some of those thousands condemned by the so-called "people's" courts.

From the gardens, you can see the burned-out villa of Goebbels, with its narrow windows. Closer, is Hitler's "orangerie", also burned out. Before you leave, the old caretaker will lead you on to the famous balcony from where Hitler accepted the ovations of the marching storm-troopers and frenzied Hitler youth. It is a sorry little balcony, from which today the eye roves over the Wilhelmplatz, where workmen are breaking up and removing some of the wreckage of the Third Reich.
