SAYS COAL DEALERS GET SHORT WEIGHT.

PHILADELPHIA, March 13.—Inquiry into the methods of weighing anthracite coal by the shippers and carriers which it is alleged, have resulted in dealers receiving short weight, was begun here Monday before Ward Prouty, examiner for the Inter-State Commerce Commission.

E. B. Crosley, general coal freight agent for the Philadelphia and Reading Railway, and John A. Merrill, scale inspector for that company, were examined and admitted that as many as five cars a minute were weighed on the sixty foot platform

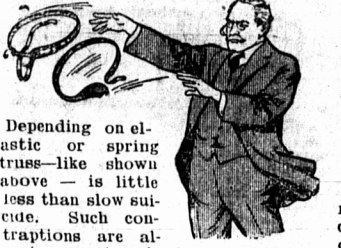
scales of the company. They described the method of weighing cars under which, it is alleged by dealers, the consignee is often obliged to pay for ice and other foreign substances which have accumulated in the cars. The hearing which will be continued here tomorrow is part of the general investigation of the subject recently ordered by the Inter-State Commerce Commission. John T. Marchand is acting as counsel for the commission and private counsel are representing the Philadelphia Coal Exchange and the Pennsylvania Retail Coal Men's Association which are among the complainants. The Pennsylvania, Philadelphia & Reading, Lehigh Valley, Central of New Jersey, Delaware, Lackawanna & Western, Erie Delaware & Hudson and the New York, Ontario and Western Railway companies have been notified to answer complaints.

ROBERT REFORM, DEAD.

MONTREAL, March 15.—Robert Reform, President of the Robert Reform Co., Ltd., and one of Montreal's most prominent citizens, died this morning, aged 82. He was a governor of McGill and last year donated \$150,000 to the University. He was the President of the Crown Trust Co., Mt. Royal Milling and Manufacturing Co., and director of the Bank of Toronto, Lake Wood Milling Co., and the Nova Scotia Steel Co. He was born in Ireland, and came to Canada in 1845.

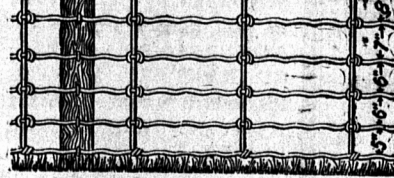

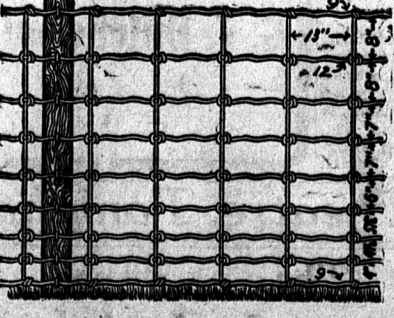

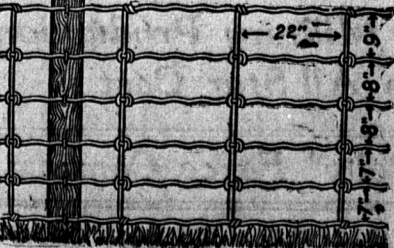
