Have a Garden

The time for fun, work, sweat, bugs, weeds, successes and disappointments in gardening is started. During 1918, boys and girls, men and women of Canada and the United States grew five million dollar bills in their back yards.

Put in one general group small plants like beets, onions, lettuce, carrots, radishes, and parsnips. In another general group put larger plants like beets, onions, lettuce, potatoes. Spreading ground vines, like melons and cucumbers, which need wider spacing should be put in another general group.

In making a plan provide space in which to enter costs and yields of the various crops. This will give you a complete record, which will be useful another year. Another helpful use of the plan is that it will guide you in the rotation of next year's crop.

In the location of a garden, it is not always possible to choose conditions as to sunlight. It is important, therefore, that in the arrangement of the various kinds of vegetables which are to be planted, due care should be given to providing the greatest exposure to the sun for those crops which need it most. Those plants which must ripen their fruits, such as tomatoes and eggplant, require the greatest amount of sunshine; while lettuce, spinach, kale and other leaf crops require relatively less.

GENEVA, June 2.—The bloody affray in front of the royal palace in Rome between Nationalists and royal guards was in reality an attempted Nationalist coup to overthrow Premier Nitti's government and bring about forcible annexation of Fiume and Dalmatia by Italy, according to uncensored news received here.

The intention of the conspirators, whose leader is supposed to be General Peppino Garibaldi, was to prevent negotiations with the Jugo Slavs, which the new cabinet has decided to resume without delay. The plot failed because Premier Nitti was warned in time. All the Nationalist plotters were arrested, but afterwards released in consequence of the protests of the Italian press. The Nationalist papers deny the existence of a plot and attack Premier Nitti violently, accusing him of having yielded to Socialist pressure.

Barely reconstituted, Nitti's cabinet is again gravely menaced by these incidents. Your correspondent understands that Premier Nitti is firmly resolved not to allow himself to be intimidated by the Nationalists and to resume the conference with the Jugo-Slavs immediately. This time the conference probably will take place not in Italy, but somewhere in Switzerland.
