Large Majority of 1st Canadian Army Are British Troops

WITH THE 1ST CANADIAN ARMY IN GERMANY, March 7 (CP Cable)—For the Northern Rhine-land offensive, now in its final stages, Gen. Crerar has ordered his 1st Canadian Army Command to consist of a large number of British formations...

When the attack began with the assault on the Reichswald, British troops made up 75 per cent of the force employed. Later, more Canadians went into the battle line and for the assault against the Reichswald last week practically all the troops employed were Canadian.

British troops did all the fighting south of Goch after the Canadian breakout of the Hochwald was blocked. The enemy bulge west of the Rhine, British and Canadian troops have equal strength in the line.

country beyond the normal life of Parliament.

The strategy of extending the life of the present Government, either by direct or indirect means, will not save the political fortunes of Mr. King, said Mr. Bracken.

"Such an extension, in the face of his many pledges not to do so, is all too patent a device to save himself many times not to during his life."

Mr. King's Pledge—"If it be said that the coming of the Victory Loan and the International Conference at San Francisco make his continuance in office a necessity, it is no answer. For five years Mr. King has known that the life of this Parliament would end on April 17 next. During that period, he has pledged himself many times not to extend his life."

"No technical excuse which allows the Government to carry on after that period will go down with the Canadian people."

Any mandate that Mr. King may have had to go to San Francisco as Canada's representative will expire with the life of Parliament. "He has no mandate to go to San Francisco to represent Canada and any approval which may be given him by the members of the House of Commons will not represent the will of the Canadian people," Mr. Bracken said.

The members of the House of Commons, too, will have outlived their mandate, whatever it may have been.

The defeat of Germany would not bring about an end to the country's manpower errors. Canada was at war with Japan, but so far no provision had been announced for sending other than volunteers.

"Can it be that this Government expects the General Service Army to fight the Japanese war too? he asked. "Have we to go through another cabinet crisis before the Army is required to bear even a share of whatever responsibilities the Government assumes for the Army's part in the Japanese war?"

Mr. Bracken outlined the program his party would carry out in the post-war if elected to office and said that the program of the C.O.P. party if carried out would mean all business into a state monopoly.

MONTREAL, March 7—(CP)—The "greatest boom" ever known in the United States automobile business was forecast here today by E. M. Sheehan, director of the National Standard Parts Association, during an address at the annual meeting of the Canadian Automobile Wholesalers Association.

"We in the United States are looking forward to the greatest boom in the automobile business, we have ever had," Mr. Sheehan said.

Mr. Sheehan added that, according to a recent survey, it would take three years from the start of production to make 5,000,000 new cars.

The following letter speaks for itself: Minister of National Defence for Air, Ottawa, Feb. 22, 1945. Mr. and Mrs. T. B. Gillespie, Carleton, P. E. Island.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Gillespie—I am writing to say that you and your Royal Canadian Air Force join me in warmly congratulating you and the members of your family on the honor and distinction which have come to your son, Flying Officer Gordon Campbell Gillespie, D.F.C., through the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross for great gallantry in the performance of his duty while serving with No. 419 Squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

The citation on which this award was made reads as follows: "This officer has completed numerous operations against the enemy in the course of which he has invariably displayed the utmost fortitude, courage and devotion to duty. The personnel of the Force are proud of your son's fine service record."

Hold New Suspect in Montreal Murder

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 7—City police tonight held a "very promising new suspect" in the 12th day of the investigation of the ski-trail murder of nine-year-old John Benson.

The suspect, police said, was a 25-year-old European and served sentences in Europe for offences against young boys.

Three other men, picked up by the police yesterday, were still being held for questioning. One of them, an amateur photographer, had been seen on Mount Royal, close to where young Benson was stabbed with a ski pole, on several occasions taking pictures of children. He was in the habit, police said, of taking pictures of children and then tell them to return at an appointed hour on Mount Royal to obtain the prints. Parents reported in some cases that children had been indecently attacked.

Young Benson was found on a Montreal ski trail, not far from the heart of Montreal, after he had been killed to death from a wound in his side. His hands were bound behind his back with ski straps and he had been indecently attacked.
