R.A.F. Raiders Blast 21 German Cities

Striking their heaviest blows in weeks, British bombers smashed at industrial targets on the Channel coast to Berlin during the night of Oct. 24-25, leaving behind them a trail of blazing docks and shattered factories. Hamburg had the worst of it; docks, ships, oil plants and a power station were hit. Berlin had its 23rd raid, and Nazis admitted "material damage." Rhine-land factory cities also were visited with low-level attacks.

Biggest merchantman to be lost in the war, the Empress exceeded by almost 10,000 tons the second largest, the German liner Columbus, who was scuttled off the Virginia coast last Dec. 19 rather than let her fall prize to a British cruiser.

Most of the 643 persons aboard the Empress were military families and a small number of military personnel.

The Empress had ferried two contingents of Canadian soldiers to Britain after her last peace-time run—from Southampton to Quebec with thousands of United States and Canadian fugitives from the war.

## NO PANIC

There was no panic aboard when fire broke out after the first incendiary bombs had landed, many boats could not be lowered because they were aflame. Iron discipline was maintained by crew and passengers. Women and children calmly stayed below for some time after the liner was hit, under orders until rescue operations could be carried out.

Sailors improvised rafts. Some 300 passengers were ordered to the forward part of the vessel and the 1920 when they were not removed until six hours after the attack.

It was not known immediately whether any Canadians were among the passengers. The ship's surgeon was believed to be the only Canadian in the crew. He is Dr. Edward Joseph Lormore, of Hamilton, Ont., who joined the liner in Canada last year. It was believed he landed with four nurses at an Irish port on Sunday. Men in the bowels of the great liner kept the engines going. They wore gas masks against smoke. Torchlight guided them as they worked.

## WARSHIPS TO RESCUE

A British flying boat spotted the blazing liner and warships were sped to the rescue.

## TIED UP WITH FRENCH TANKS

Although the sudden extension of war to the Balkans has overshadowed German pressure on Vichy France to enter an economic and political partnership with the Germans, diplomats at the quarters here are convinced that the two are related.

It is believed that the Axis powers are attempting to establish a "common order" in Europe under German control extending from Norway clear across the low countries to assist the Axis in the Balkans with the object among others, of persuading the United States that the British Empire is shattered and not worth attempts to salvage.

Greece's fleet was guarding the upper Aegean, massed, by preparation for a possible attack. It consisted of a cruiser, 14 destroyers, 13 torpedo boats, six submarines and eight minesweepers.

For fifteen minutes Metaxas talked by telephone with President Inonu of Turkey. Neutral sources relayed reports that Turkish troops were entering Thrace, the northeast of Greece, on their way to help their recent neighbor.

These reports were not confirmed, and Turkey—like Yugoslavia and Bulgaria, the other 20-nation states immediately affected by the invasion—was silent, officially.

Turkey is not obligated directly to go to the aid of Greece, but British and Turkish and British are bound together by a defensive pact of mutual assistance.

Greece had little or no hope for help from Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. She faced the possibility of German attack through Rumania and Bulgaria—for Rumania is crowded with German troops, and there were reports that German soldiers are fighting with the Rumanians.

Metaxas, however, conferred at length with Yugoslav officials.

He ordered general mobilization, sending Greece's army to some 600,000 regulars and reserves, and followed this up with a "political mobilization" of all business and industry.

Then, after time, Italian airplanes flew over Athens and anti-aircraft roared. Tonight the ancient city was in a blackout. The planes bombed the great port of Piraeus, four miles from Athens, the Athens airport and the port of Patras.

No bombs fell in Athens itself in the daylight hours. A hangar was reported damaged at the airport and docks and buildings were wrecked at Patras, with four dead and 17 injured.
