Russia Annuls Limit Set For Inheritances

MOSCOW, Nov. 15.—The Soviet Government made a distinct departure from doctrines of pure Communism to-day by annulling the law which set the legal limit for inheritances in Russia at \$5,000. Henceforth in Russia any inheritance in spite of the Government's severe opposition to private trade may have accumulated fortunes, but have withheld them from investment in internal enterprises. The Government thereby losing the benefit of actual capital.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

Great activity is to be seen along the waterfront these days and everywhere hustle and bustle is the predominant feature. The writer on a casual stroll yesterday was amazed at the amount of work being done all along the piers, and as one brawny son of the docks expressed it, "It's just like the good old days and 'ere's 'oping it will continue for a while yet."

The first wharf visited was L. M. Poole's, there teams were very much in evidence hauling cedar posts, shingles, boards, etc., and altogether a very busy appearance prevailed. The Schooner Urania, Miramichi has just finished discharging a load of lumber at this wharf.

The next wharf, that of J. Caragher & Co. was also crowded with carts hauling and dumping coal. This firm had a number of vessels last week and this discharging Sydney Coal. The wharf of A. Pickard & Co. yesterday was manifest with lots of life, the large coal piles both in the sheds and on the wharf giving evidence of much discharging. The Carl Richards, Pictou and the Nellie King, Sydney are unloading and will make way for other vessels.

Lying off the Marine wharf and coincidentally so the "Marine," a three top-master majestically riding at anchor, Capt. Trenholm in command, greets the writer's eye, and on quizzing as to what she is doing there is informed that she is waiting for a chance to get "alongside" for her cargo of "spuds." She is a huge vessel and capable of carrying thousands of bushels.

C. Lyons & Co are busy unloading 2500 tons of Scotch coal from the steamer Stranna, Glasgow, Scotland, Capt. B. Haugland in command. She is a Norwegian steamer and has made three trips here this year. She started to discharge yesterday and expects to leave on Friday for England, via Pictou, where she will load lumber for the Old Country.

W. D. Gillis and Co. expect a steamer this week from Sydney with 1200 tons of soft coal. The Railway wharf, perhaps the busiest spot of all, these days, is an interesting place to visit; hundreds upon hundreds of cars filled to the doors with "Island beauties" such as "McIntyres," "Blues," "Cobblers," "Reds," "White Mountains," etc., all going to make up the 25000 sacks of potatoes being loaded aboard the Orkild from Montreal, Buntain and Bell, Agents, for New York. The Orkild is a splendid freighter and hails from Copenhagen, Denmark. Messrs Buntain & Bell are also agents for the S. S. Sapper which arrived in port last week and left yesterday morning for St. Johns, Newfoundland, with a large general cargo. The Orkild expects to leave port on Thursday; her place will be taken however by the Wagland also from Montreal. She left that port Saturday and will arrive here sometime this week to load 30,000 additional sacks of potatoes for Long Island. Taken all in all the waterfront is certainly a laborer's paradise this fall and a Godsend for those who will not perhaps find steady employment this winter.

It is expected that the approximate estimate of the potato shipments this year will reach in value the sum of \$3,000,000.

Cayuga Indians Withdraw Claim

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—The century-old claim of the Cayuga Indian tribe of Canada, for more than a million-dollar reservation in the United States government, growing out of the surrender of Indian lands in New York State, was withdrawn before the British-United States arbitral claims commission here today.

Counsel for the Indians declared that the British government was planning if the claim was granted, to turn the proceeds over to the Canadian government, and for that reason the tribe had decided to allow the case to rest on its present status. The attorney likened the action of the British government to "abandonment of the Indians by their protector."

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 16.—Late last night coastguardsmen and customs inspectors surrounded an alleged band of rum runners and narcotic smugglers by land and water and arrested five men, one a Canadian and seized a 35-foot power launch, two trucks, and a coupe, one hundred cases of ale and a small quantity of cocaine on the shore of Lake Ontario at Oklahama just east of Sea Breeze.

The arrest and seizure took place without a shot being fired. These arrested and who had charges placed against them early this morning were: E. D. Woodward, Rochester, alleged owner of the launch, and Fred Brooks, Brighton, Ont., both charged with possessing, smuggling, transporting ale, and M. Azonally, and Edward A. Barry, both of this city, charged with aiding and abetting smuggling operations.

The sixth members of the band escaped. ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 16.—Summer-like weather in this region followed the eruption last week of Mount Shishaldin, an active volcano on Unimak Island, in the Aleutian archipelago, more than six hundred miles southwest of here. Rivers are remaining open mountains a hundred miles north are smoking, and the whole land-escape remains green. Inspectors in remote sections are being held prisoners by the open water, for they have been waiting for the "fivers to freeze so they can make their way out. Many are reported short of provisions due to the unusually long season. Lack of frost and snow is particularly noticeable, for mountains usually covered with snow at this time of the year.

Homeless Wanderer Found Dead At Guysboro, N. S.

GUYSBORO, N. S., Nov. 16.—A man claiming to be a homeless wanderer and giving his name as George A. White, about sixty years of age, was found dead yesterday in a shack he had been permitted to build near the village of North Riverside this county. The man had been given shelter by Edward MacDonald and had engaged to cut pulpwood during the winter. His death was believed due to heart disease. The dead man had claimed to have a brother living near Saint John, N. B., but all attempts to complete identification had been unsuccessful tonight.

France Will Remit Fine On Damascus

JERUSALEM, Nov. 16.—France has decided to remit the fine of \$500,000 assessed against Damascus following the October rising there, according to a despatch from Beirut which credits the decision to the acting French High Commissioner. Meanwhile guerrilla bands continue to operate throughout the country.
