THERE were 50 passengers from East River ports by the S. S. City of London Friday morning and the following cargo: 30 bags of potatoes, 15 barrelsysters, 12 tubs of butter, 15 lambs and 5 cases eggs.

THERE were 10 passengers and a general cargo of merchandise to Craupaud on Saturday by the S. S. City of London. The return cargo consisted of 122 dressed hogs, 1 beef cow, 10 tubs butter, 12 barrels, 2 bags and 9 boxes produce, one piano and 2 ton iron and rope.

AN Annapolis, Md., despatch referring to the arrival of the British fleet at that place, says: The British fleet surprised everyone with its prompt appearance. It was due to the speed test which the fleet has been put since its departure from Halifax. The fleet maintained an average of eighteen knots an hour, and arrived here about six hours ahead of schedule time. The Drake especially made some phenomenal records for short distances.

The movement for the prohibition of the importation of ardent spirits into Prince Edward Island is not of recent origin. In 1840 according to the Colonial Herald of Saturday Feb'y 22nd, in that year, at a meeting of the committee of the Charlottetown Temperance Society a resolution was passed that a petition be presented to the Legislature, praying for the prohibition of the importation and distillation of ardent spirits and that copies of the aforesaid petition be forwarded to the different temperance societies throughout the Island.

ONE hundred and nineteen sailing vessels were loaded with coal at the Dominion Coal Company's International piers during the month of October. Most of the cargoes went to Newfoundland and Nova Scotia ports, while a large quantity was also shipped to New Brunswick and P. E. Island ports, and St. Pierre, Miq. The number of schooners loaded at International pier since the opening of navigation in May was 459. Nearly all the coal loaded in schooners comes from Reserve Colliery. —Sydney Record, 2nd.
