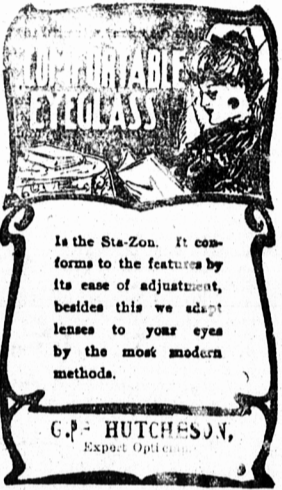

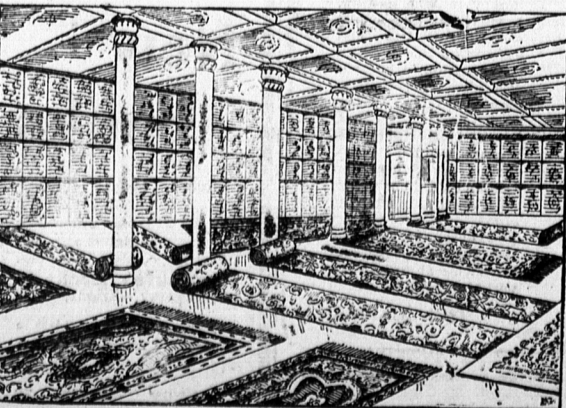

THE WESTERN HARVEST IN FULL SWING.

The Territories Want Laborers—Help is Scarce in Portage la Prairie District Also.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 24.—Favorable crop reports are being received from all western points. Wheat-cutting is now becoming general in the southern and central portions of the Province. An Oxbow, N. W. T., despatch reads:—"Harvesting in full swing. Send up 300 harvesters immediately out of that Montreal excursion." From all points of the west comes the cry for help.

Portage la Prairie, Aug. 24.—The wheat already cut is a fine sample. The kernels are plump and hard, that would nearly all grade No. 1 hard or No. 1 northern. Many of the farmers are complaining of the scarcity of farm labor, as they cannot hire men to assist in harvesting, and are anxiously waiting for the arrival of the harvesters from the east. If the present favorable conditions of weather continue, thrashing will commence in about two weeks' time.

Secretary Frank Fowler at the Grain Dealers' Association looks for a 22-bushel average around Morden and in other districts crops will be heavier and better than ever. At Moose Jaw Mr. Fowler thought it was the best crop he ever saw, while the Arcola district would show an 18-bushel average. Everybody is cutting something, but he says the wheat cutting is not general. In many places it will not commence for a week. Clean crops are everywhere apparent and no one has suffered to any extent.

CHEAPER GAS FOR MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—In consequence of the withdrawal by the Montreal Light Heat and Power Co. of their offer to supply the city with gas at \$1 per thousand feet on condition that they are granted a franchise for fifty years, Ald. Vallier will submit a resolution at the next meeting of the city council to the effect that the company be asked to supply the city with cheaper gas. This he considers will be looked upon as an ultimatum and will, he believes, certainly be refused. "I shall then," he stated, "move that the money be borrowed by the city for the purchase of the Municipal Gas Co. There will be a lot of opposition to this, I know, but it has got to come in the end, for at the present time the city is at the mercy of the company."

23 WHALES IN 12 DAYS.

OTTAWA, August 24.—Preston, on his forthcoming visit to the Gulf, will make a call at Seven Islands, the headquarters of the Quebec Steam Whaling company. The company has been encouraged by the success of the whaling industry off Newfoundland and has established a large plant at Seven Islands with every indication of making the business pay. Although somewhat late commencing operations this season the whalers of the Quebec company succeeded in killing twenty-three whales in twelve days. One whale alone gave 87 barrels of oil.
