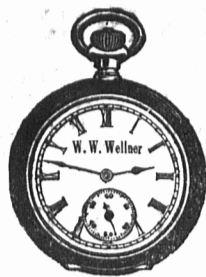

THE funeral of the late John McInnis was solemnized this afternoon at two o'clock from his home on Broad Street. Rev. Samuel A. The floral tributes were both profuse and beautiful, and bore silent witness to the high regard entertained for Mr. McInnis. The remains were interred in the Plainville Cemetery. Mr. McInnis was born Oct. 29 1817 at Martinvale, Prince Edward Island. He was the son of John and Flora McInnis. At the age of 19 he moved to Maine, remaining there a number of years. He returned to his old home and remained there one winter. In the year of 1850, he married Mary J. Horne at Stoneham, after which he moved to North Attleboro. From the time he has been in North Attleboro and Plainville, he was employed by the firm of Robinson Bros. He has lived in Plainville three years, having been ill two years of this time. He leaves to mourn their loss, two small children, Mary Alice and George W., and wife. He also leaves three sisters, Mary A., Kate, Jessie and four brothers, James, Daniel, Neil and Angus. He was a man of more than ordinary mental ability and was loved by all who knew him.
