It was learned authoritatively that if the Chinese at Hankow should attempt a repetition of the Nanking outrage, the foreign warships will act without delay.

Lost Capsule of Radium Found

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, April 21.—The capsule of radium, worth \$6,000 which was lost in the Western Hospital yesterday, was found in the hospital incinerator by means of an endoscope late last night by movement of a delicate needle on the investment which was loaned by the university of Toronto for use in the search for the capsule and operated by a radium expert, indicated the position of the powerful element which throws off rays with peculiar electrical properties.

Crockett, sitting in the front of a cloud was seen approaching for fifteen minutes before the truck, nearly all of the inhabitants rushed to storm cellars where they remained until after the danger had passed. G. N. Overstreet was killed.

Bad Fire In Central Japan

(Canadian Press) LONDON, April 21.—A fire which is believed to have caused casualties and destroyed about 1,000 houses in the town of Kanazawa, is reported in an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Tokyo. The fire swept through the town which is in central Japan fanned by a high wind doing damage estimated at 5,000 yen (about \$2,500,000). Kanazawa has a population of 129,000.

Ministry to Continue in Office

NANKING DEPOT SHELLED BY CANTONESE

Numerous Casualties Resulted-- Railway Staff Fled in Panic. (Special to the Guardian) SHANGHAI, April 21.—An unconfirmed rumor was received from Nanking that Michael Borodin, Russian advisor to the Hankow government previously reported in a hospital in the foreign quarters of Hankow was under detention. From Nanking it was learned by wireless that firing between that city and Pukow, on the opposite side of the Yangtze had been resumed. Shells from Pukow fell on the railway station at Nanking resulting in numerous casualties. The railway staff fled in panic. Nanking is held by the Cantonese (nationalist) troops, while Pukow is in the hands of the northerners.

Stock Perish In Alberta Blizzard

(Special to the Guardian) CORONA, Alta., April 21.—Some stock perished in this district in the thirty eight hour blizzard which blew itself out yesterday. One herd of cattle wandered into a slough and were practically frozen in the owner figuring he would lose about twenty. The task of extricating the animals was not finished last night. This is the biggest individual loss reported. The nice weather preceding the storm tempted stockmen to let their stock out.
