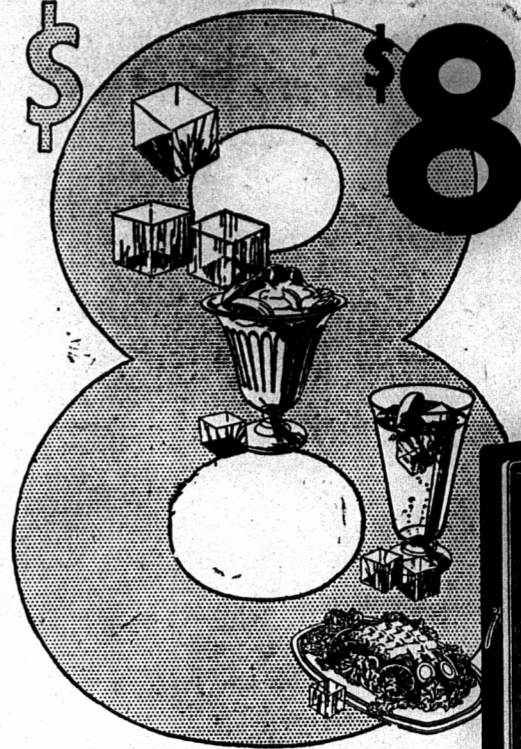

MONTREAL, May 15—(By the Canadian Press)—The explosion of a huge tank of asphalt in preparation, at the premises of the Imperial Oil Refineries, Limited, here Saturday claimed one life. Four other workmen were seriously burned and a number of others sustained minor injuries.

"Doc Dobbin" Passes Away

MONTREAL, May 15—Medical science has lost a valuable assistant with the death of old "Doc Dobbin," a large black work horse whose blood had supplied diphtheria antitoxin for the treatment of more than 41,000 children. Old "Doc" died suddenly on the farm near here where 150 horses are kept for the making of serum. He was 21 years old and a native of the western plains. Two years ago old "Doc" was the guest at a birthday party attended by local school children. Mickey, a twelve-year-old bay, also a westerner, henceforth will supply the blood for the serum for children. He has been at the farm five years.

Unusual Manner To Break Leg

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 14 (By the Canadian Press)—Claude Haynes of Tay Creek, N. B., sustained a broken leg in a most unusual manner yesterday while working for the New Brunswick electric power commission near Keswick on a transmission line extension. He fell from the top of a load of poles and as he rolled downhill struck one of his legs against the other hard enough to sustain a serious fracture.

FEARS LOSS OF HIS LAND WRITES TO HIS MAJESTY

REGINA, Sask., May 16—(By the Canadian Press)—Oscar I. Denton wrote a letter to the King. He got what he wanted, but whether he got it because of his letter is another story. In any case, the letter passed through a good many official hands. Denton lives at Horton, Kan., but he owns land near Avonlea, Sask., which he feared losing because of tax arrears. On Dec. 15, last he wrote to His Majesty, King George, asking if something could not be done about it. Here is what happened to the letter: It was delivered at Buckingham Palace Jan. 1. His Majesty's secretary answered it and also wrote to Lord Beesborough, governor-general of Canada. The governor-general wrote to the lieutenant-governor of Saskatchewan, which referred the matter to the department of municipal affairs. Denton will not lose his land. An official of the department has informed him of a special act of the Saskatchewan Legislature which prevents loss of title of person in just his position despite tax arrears. He was also advised of further protection he could obtain on application to the municipal council.

Slight Lowering Of Insurance Rates Probable

OTTAWA, May 16—(By the Canadian Press)—The probability of a slight lowering of insurance rates on grain moved out of Churchill this season, was indicated in the House of Commons today by Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals. Dr. Manion said that the government has been making every effort to have the insurance rates out of Churchill lowered, and that certain information received appeared to indicate a measure of success.

AVONDALE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The monthly meeting of the Avondale Women's Institute was held at the home of Mrs. Felix Murphy on May 10th. Eleven members and three visitors were present. Meeting opened by a piano selection. Roll Call was answered by "Housecleaning Hints". Several letters were read, and there was a discussion on these, and also on ways and means of making money for the Institute. It was moved and seconded that a dollar be sent to the Sanatorium to buy mattress covers. The next meeting is to be in the school room on June 14th, Roll Call to be answered by paying a nickel. Meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

Denies Being A Communist

HALIFAX, N. S., May 15—(By the Canadian Press)—"I am not a Communist; I never was a Communist, and I never expect to be a Communist," was the declaration of Orton Wade, released from detention here yesterday, as he boarded a westbound train for Winnipeg. Establishment of the fact of his Canadian birth had obviated the possibility of his deportation. "I was a member of the Workmen's Unity League of Winnipeg," Wade said. "It is an organization pledged to support the claims of the unemployed for human treatment; to present a united front on behalf of the unemployed in that city." He, with Conrad Cessinger and Dan Holmes, final disposition of whose cases is pending, had been talking together after a meeting when they were arrested, Wade said. They had been taken out of the city at once and placed aboard an eastbound train. Wade declared he had been treated well at all times and compared conditions at the detention quarters here to "restaurant service."
