The Presbytery of P. E. I.

The Presbytery met in Keir Memorial Church, Malpeque, on Tuesday, November 1st, with the Moderator, the Rev. C. D. Henderson in the chair, and the clerk, the Rev. T. H. B. Somers at the desk. The following ministers were also present: Rev. G. C. Webster, Rev. J. A. McGowan, Rev. C. Carnegie, Rev. F. N. Young, Rev. W. A. Young, Rev. D. A. Campbell, Rev. G. B. Cunningham, Rev. Donald Nicholson, together with the following Elders: Mr. Ernest MacPherson of Dunblane; Mr. D. A. MacKinnon and Mr. A. A. MacDonald of Charlottetown; Mr. Arriens MacSwain of Montague; Mr. Oswald Gray, of Peter's Road; Mr. Alex Chisholm of Malpeque; Mr. Brecken Simmons of Summerside and Mr. Everett Hardy of Free-land.

After routine business was handled a call was considered from the Presbytery of Hamilton in favour of the Rev. Chas. Carnegie to St. David's Church there. Mr. Donald Baker, Mr. Simmons and Mr. James Marchbank all spoke of Mr. Carnegie's work and assured him of the good wishes of the Summerside congregation in his new undertaking. Appreciation of the Presbytery was expressed in a resolution which also included good wishes to Mrs. Carnegie. The pastorate concludes on November 5th and the Rev. J. A. McGowan was appointed Interim-Moderator of Summerside.

A delegation from the Bradalbane congregation was heard in the persons of Mr. C. MacLeod, Mr. D. A. Matheson and Mr. C. Matheson and the support of the Court was given on specified conditions in their response to the requirements of the Church Extension Board. The congratulations of the Presbytery were expressed to the four congregations of the Clyde River Charge on the progress of the work on their new manse. The Clerk read the necessary papers and the court took the steps to secure the incorporation under the 1935 Act of the trustees of the Lot 14 Congregation at Richmond Bay.

Approval in principle was given to the Augmentation Plan whereby it is hoped that the Church will materially increase its stipend of ministers on augmented charges and on self-sustaining charges that are paying now only the minimum stipend.

Certification was voted to the splendid work of Mr. A. K. Campbell, student missionary at Marshfield and now returned to Knox College for his final year in theology. The report of the Budget Convener showed that all but four congregations had contributed to the budget in 1938 and that four-teen had exceeded their allocation. The budget for 1939 has been stably increased in order to implement the provisions of the Augmentation Plan and to extend the missionary and educational work of the Church. Allocations totalling nearly \$10,000 were assigned to the congregations for the coming year.

The Court was honoured with a visit from the Rev. J. S. Clarke of Toronto, Secretary of the Board of Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies, who outlined the

(Continued from Page 2) and then mix it with boiled rice—it makes a real Chinese dish. Rice is rationed in England but we had taken our own, fortunate—as it is very light and easy to pack and makes a relieving substitute for potatoes. We had taken over some Island cheese, done up in tin foil to prevent tainting other foods. The English cheese ration is very minute. We were lucky to have it along as it is such a good substitute for milk in calcium content, and do you know we did not have a glass of milk while there. If we went again we would take along some powdered milk as it is light and can be used so conveniently. While staying with various English families we noticed that the housewives did very little baking. They buy most of their bakery products. One reason is the great scarcity of butter and cooking fat. The Central Creameries inform me that they are doing up a shipment of butter in tin cans and Mr. Simmons says that he sees no reason why you could not do the same providing you have a canner and the butter. Canada Packers say tinned butter usually sells for approximately 75c a tin, and Mr. Simmons says that he has seen one of our various "mixes" in a food parcel—a cake mix, muffin mix or such. Have you ever tried making your own? This recipe makes about 12 medium biscuits: 3 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 3 tablespoons dried milk powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 table-
