It was learned yesterday that Harry "Kid" Poulton, Island welterweight boxing champion has been offered a chance to go to the State of New York to continue on his boxing career.

The offer came in the form of a letter from a boxing promoter by the name of Nat Forman of Brooklyn, N.Y. who states: "I would like to know if you care to come here to New York City and box under my personal management. You will be handled with good care and be in a position to be developed into a successful fighter. Here the boys get fifty dollars for four rounds, and one hundred dollars for six rounds. As you know, here is the place for a fellow if he wants to do well in the boxing game. If you were here, I would start you in the six round bouts, and then we could judge when to go into the eight round bouts."

In a brief interview with Poulton last night he stated that he was "definitely interested in the offer" as he felt that it would be at least a great opportunity to gain experience even if he doesn't stay there permanently.
