## Matthews And Babcock Finalists In Maritime Golf Championship Play

Veteran Golfer Hailing From Baltimore Will Match Strokes With Young Halifax Star Today.

HALIFAX, Aug. 15.—Interest soared tonight in anticipation of the finals for the Maritime Provinces Golf Association Championship which should produce a thrilling battle between age and youth of two nations.  
After eliminating Dr. P. C. Jarboe of Chester and Ray Gettiffe of Saint John in the semi-finals this morning respectively, 54-year-old J. M. Matthews of Baltimore and Chester, last year's Nova Scotia champion and Maritime senior titleholder, and 29-year-old B. Babcock, son of a Halifax professional, polished their clubs and rested for their 36-hole battle over Ashburn's hazardous links tomorrow.  
With all divisions in the final stage, no matches were played this afternoon and competitors lazed around in driving, putting and approaching contests.

### OFF COLOR

Ray Gettiffe, the 21-year-old Maritime League hockeyer, who eliminated Frank Mielke of Halifax, the ace-high favorite yesterday in the quarter-finals, could not reach the brilliant heights he attained then when he came up against the polished playing of Babcock today.  
Taking no chances, the young Halifaxian played orthodox golf all the way, while Gettiffe went over par several times to lose important holes. If the Saint John ice-star had shot the inspired golf he did against Mielke, however, the Fundy City might have had a chance of claiming his third Maritime championship in four years.  
Swinging into an early lead, Babcock was never headed in the match. He won six holes, lost three and halved the rest, though both players had the same scores for the round they completed after the match ended on the 10th—78's.

### MATTHEWS BRILLIANT

The Matthews-Jarboe match was far more sensational with the bronzed winner putting fendishly to go out in 33, one below par. Against such playing, Jarboe, who hit longer and truer balls, had little chance.  
The match ended on the 14th when Matthews sank a long 20-foot putt to go down in four for a halve.

### DRIVING COMPETITION

Three tremendous drives brought G. Butler of Dartmouth the prize for the amateur driving competition. The 326 yards aggregate he amassed was far greater than the 558 that Jack Hitchcock of Charlottetown needed to win the professional competition.  
An approaching and putting competition resulted in a tie between Hal Connor and Don Rainnie of Ashburn. Both had 11 strokes for four holes and will play off tomorrow morning.  
Just before the start of the amateur championship round, 11 Maritime professionals were eliminated to get away on 36 holes of medal play for the Association purse and professional championship.

## Giants Increase Lead Defeating Cardinals 5-4

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—New York Giants snook St. Louis Cardinals deeper into second place here today, winning a 5-4 victory in the third game of the series as the desperate world champions, now trailing by four full games, beat themselves in their anxiety.  
Fidgety Phil Collins, third St. Louis heaver, wild pitched the same way in the seventh, sailing a fast one over Bill Delaney's head to let Travis Jackson, Giant third baseman, trot home with the deciding run.  
Bobby Brown before Boston fans hitted two-hit ball to shut out Cincinnati Reds and win his first game of the season for the Braves. He ran the lowly Braves' winning streak to three straight games. The score was 8-0.

Paul Derringer, Reds' pitcher, and Ernie Lombard, catcher, made the only Cincinnati hits, in the fifth and in the seventh, respectively, but both came after two were out. The tribemans, in the meantime, found Derringer no puzzle.

### CUBS TRIM DODGERS

While Lonnie Warneke pitched a steady game for his 13th victory of the season Chicago Cubs battered out an 11-3 victory over the Dodgers today at Brooklyn.  
Tom Zachary was the victim of an eight run assault in the first two innings, started by Frank Demaree's triple with the bases full and completed by Truck Stainback's homer with two aboard.  
Joe Bowman held Pittsburgh Pirates to seven hits and chalked up his sixth straight triumph as the Phillies hammered three Pittsburgh batters for 19 safeties and a 9-1 victory at Philadelphia.  
Allen hit a homer for the Phils, and every other man in the lineup got into the hit column.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—New York Yankees staged one big rally today at Cleveland after Willis Hudlin had held them to a single hit in the first six innings and did enough scoring to beat Cleveland Indians 3-1.

## With The Trotters And Pacers At The Exhibition Track

It isn't a case of bringing horses to race at the Exhibition this year, but it is a case of getting accommodation for the race horses. Every stall will be filled over the week end, and accommodation will have to be secured for some time in advance. The actual number of horses that will take part in Tuesday's, Wednesday's, and Thursday's events, will number about ninety—the largest number for several years. Some of these will start twice.

It is interesting to look over the names, and to learn something of their history. Take for instance TOLL GATE, 2:00 1/4. Until he was three years of age, he was a prize wagon. One day he received a scare while his master was peddling meat. He stepped so fast that the owner became convinced that he had speed, so took him to the track a few evenings afterwards. That was the last of the meat cart for TOLL GATE. He was put in training, and won twelve firsts that year. Two years after, he was racing on the rating Grand for purses of from two to twenty-five thousand dollars. After a series of clean-ups in the smaller purse races, he was started at Toledo, Ohio, in a twenty-five thousand dollar stake. Hundreds of Canadians came down to see him race, and to back him with their money. Pari-mutuals did not do the race justice, because the Americans considered they had plenty horses in the race that could take the measure of the Canadian horse. TOLL GATE was beaten the fifth heat rather badly, but he hid in front. The Brownie horse is a half-brother to the world's sensational sire, Guy Abbie, 2:04 1/4, and many other ones.

HEATHERBELLE, 2:10. Brent McKinnis' trotter, in the hands of Frank Cameron, is picked to win HEATHERBELLE likes the Charlottetown track, has been a frequent winner over it, and will no doubt put up a wonderful performance next Tuesday.  
PATRICK DIRECT, 2:07 1/4. He will make his first start for several weeks at Charlottetown. He is the big bay pacer that set up a new track record of 2:07 1/4 at Moncton last year. We have never seen him smoother or better gaited than he was in a work out yesterday.

BETTY S., 2:07. Well, you know as much about her as we do. She is one of the consistent kind that can almost always pace around 2:10. Although she got a setback at Moncton, losing the first heat, still she everyone believes because she has the winning habit, that she cannot be trimmed. BETTY, before coming to the Maritimes, was one of the top flight pacers in Ohio. The State in which the very best have raced for big purses. It was there she took a record of 2:07, winning the race.

ALAN HARVESTER, 2:07. This is the name of the trotter that accounted for two trotting events at the Exhibition last year. He showed a lot of class, trotting around 2:12 a couple of trips, and sharing with others the honour of the fastest mile trotted during the meeting. ALAN will be back again, and we presume he will be in good form, as he is in the expert hands of E. B. Avery. However, we have no line on him this year, that is, we haven't noticed his having taken part in any races.

Other trotters at the meet will be LUSTY FRISCO, 2:07 1/4, Charlie Chandler's great trotter. Many are predicting he will displace the present Island record of 2:10, on Tuesday next, when he meets Alan Harvester, Calumet Bee 2:12, Hollywood Lee, 2:09 and others.

The 224 Pace at Charlottetown will probably be raced on Tuesday, and it is possible that the entries may be so numerous that elimination heats will have to be used. Of course, there is a possibility some will withdraw and prefer to start the 221 Pace later on in the week.

In winning the first division of the Progressive purse she trotted in 2:00, a new world race record for four year olds and she won the next two heats in 2:01 and 2:02, also establishing a new record for three heats, previously held jointly by Calumet Crusader and Tronia Britton, their heats averaged slightly faster than 2:03. The previous record for four year olds was 2:00 3/4 made by Prince Hall in 1934.

Berry, who leads the race winning drivers of the season, also won the stake for three year olds with Miss Kate B., owned by W. N. Reynolds of Winston Salem, N. C. She broke and lost the second heat to the Saint but was best in the other two.
