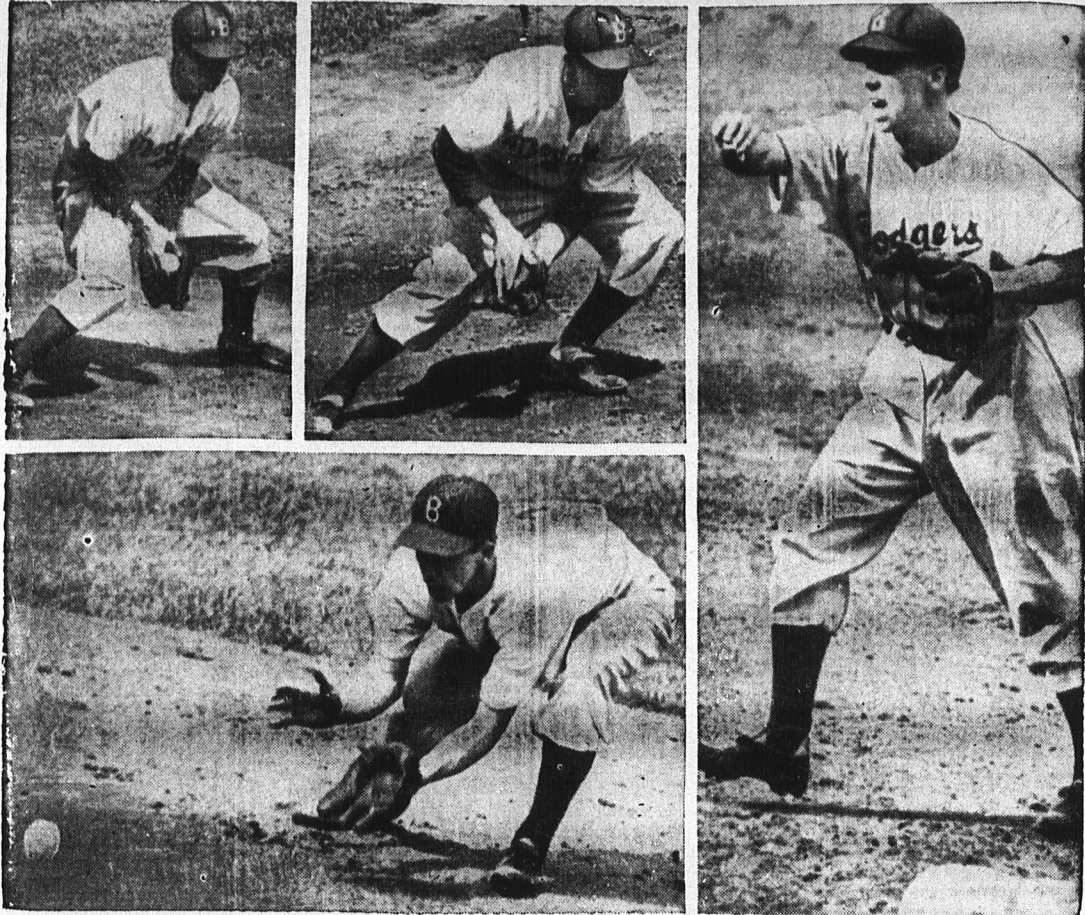

## Cubs Humble Dodgers In Gaining 14-1 Victory

NEW YORK, May 19 (AP)—Chicago Cubs, hopping on Casey and Mace Brown for nine runs in the second inning, buried the erstwhile National League-leading Brooklyn Dodgers under a humiliating 14-1 score today before 13,100 Chicago spectators.

This was the Cubs' second straight victory over the Dodgers, and sent them into second place behind St. Louis Cardinals, but there is a possibility neither game will count in the standings. Midway of today's game manager Leo Durocher announced he was protesting both games, contending the Cubs had 26 men on the active list, one over the limit. His protest was forwarded to league president Ford Frick for possible action.

LONDON, May 19 (CP)—Major John B. Glubb, the "Second Lawrence of Arabia" was reported today to have been killed or wounded while fighting in the Near East, where he has lived for 22 years among nomadic Arab tribes.

**THE STORY OF THE "MARGARET RAIT"**

In 1840, the whale ship "Margaret Rait", 308 tons, left St. John, N.B. on a trip which lasted forty-two months. Their "most troublesome" whale was encountered off the Galapagos Islands.

The mate, Joseph Kenney of Barrington, N.S., harpooned it but the whale crushed his boat between its jaws. In the long battle which followed, the whale capsized the Captain's boat and crushed the stern of the third mate's as well as knocking a man out of the Captain's boat for the second time. Finally, when it was growing dark, the mate in a fresh boat, managed to strike his lance into the whale's vitals.

After many adventures but no casualties, the "Margaret Rait" reached London where the cargo was sold for £18,600.
