LOBSTER INVESTIGATIONS.—Dr. Knight, Chairman of the Biological Board of Canada, is in Charlottetown today. He has been conducting experiments in the South coast of Prince County with a view to ascertaining the advisability of beginning the lobster fishing on the first, rather than on the 15th of August. The experiments were conducted from Victoria harbor on the east to West Point on the west and necessitated fishing at Victoria, Borden, Summerside, Cape Egmont, Higgins' Wharf and West Point. The result of his observations will be laid before the Department of Fisheries as soon as they can be tabulated and studied. The Minister of Fisheries will in due time announce the results and the decision which he reaches from the facts submitted to him.
