### THE CIVIC ELECTION TODAY.

Today our citizens enjoy the important privilege of selecting the Mayor, Councillors and Water Commissioners who are to exercise official control over civic affairs for two years to come. For all of these positions except the Councilorships of Wards One and Two there are competitive elections and the voters will record their preference at the polls today. The candidates for the Mayoralty are especially well known and their views upon civic affairs are sufficiently understood to give the electors an opportunity for making an intelligent and judicious choice.

For Water and Sewerage Commissioners there are four candidates for the three seats, two of the number having been members of the late Board, which rendered satisfactory service. A majority of the candidates for Councilorships in the contested wards served in the late Council and will naturally be judged by their records. The new candidates are generally well known to the electors of their respective wards. These conditions afford an opportunity of selecting a good city government if the best men offering are chosen in a legitimate and business-like way.

A word of caution may be timely in regard to improper practices, which are always liable to creep in and which we trust will be avoided by all candidates and their agents and supporters, so that the election may be conducted in all respects in a lawful, sober and dignified manner, befitting our usually well-conducted and orderly city. An election so carried out will be fair to all, will leave no unpleasant after-results and will command the respect and approval of all right-thinking citizens.

### ALCOHOL IN HOSPITALS.

Sir Victor Horsley of London in addressing the meeting of the British Medical Association in Toronto in August last, among other things said:

"When I was a student alcohol was the traditional remedy in surgery for post-operative conditions; it was the traditional remedy for blood-poisoning, septicemia and pyemia, following operations, and it was the traditional remedy for infectious diseases like pneumonia. What is the practice now? That in all these cases alcohol is being no longer used.

"Forty years ago the seven great hospitals in London spent annually about \$40,000 for alcoholic liquors and about \$15,000 for milk. Now alcohol and milk have changed places and the larger sum is expended for milk and the smaller for alcohol. In the infirmary at Salisbury twenty-five years ago \$1,500 was spent annually on alcoholic liquors. Last year the cost was only \$35. These changes are due to increased knowledge of the nature and effects of alcohol."

It will be remembered that last year Sir Frederick Treves, King Edward's surgeon, made an equally strong address against the use of alcoholic liquors in the way of beverages or for medicinal use. We cite these facts and the opinions of these eminent men and the changed practice of the great hospitals of the world in regard to the medicinal use of spirits and wines because certain antiquated doctors of medicine,

following the practice of half a century ago, are still prescribing alcoholic stimulants for half the ills that flesh is heir to, and are either ignorantly or wilfully blind to the conclusions of modern medical science.

### DOMINION OFFICIALS AND TAXES.

An important decision was rendered on Friday last by the Supreme Court of New Brunswick as to the liability of Dominion officials to pay municipal taxes. In brief the city of Saint John claimed the right to tax the salaries of Federal Canadian officials resident there. A test case was made and the Court unanimously decided in favor of the city, notwithstanding a previous decision that federal officials were not liable. The judgment was delivered by Chief Justice Barker and was based on a recent decision of the Privy Council in certain Australian cases.

The decision will commend itself to the general sense of justice in the country, and especially to the mass of taxpayers who are not on the federal pay-roll. Of course if this is good law in New Brunswick it is good law in all the other Provinces of the Dominion, and will no doubt be applied all over the country. We have never been able to see any good reason why the salaries of Dominion officials should not be liable to taxation the same as other salaries, and this view has been shared by some at least of the officials themselves, who did not pay, only because they felt that they were not legally obligated to do so.

### over lost trade and think it would find that nothing happens by chance.

In the present competitive age sentiment does not govern trade. Personal gain is the sole object of trade and if we deal with foreign department stores it is because we can either buy cheaper or better. We have no grudge against the retail merchant. He is a necessary evil of the competitive age that must be tolerated, but he is at least short-sighted to draw attention to his own failing in the press. The catalogues of department stores are as valuable to the intelligent farmer and his family as the Experimental Farm Bulletins, because they are the only source from which he can get an idea of the fair selling price of manufactured articles. Our press terms with information relative to the cost of production and market price of agricultural products, for the benefit of the benighted farmer. We can find it figured out to a nicety what it costs to produce a pound of pork, bushel of potatoes etc., but how often are we told what it costs at the factory to make an axe, a pair of shoes, hat, binder etc! Why should a merchant have from fifteen to one hundred per cent profit on the articles he handles when the farmer is compelled to sell what he produces at less than cost? Farmers were complimented last fall on the good prices ruling for their products, but I defy Merchant to prove that potatoes at twenty-five cents per bushel or oats at forty cents per bushel are sold at a profit by the average farmer who has got to sell the raw products of his farm.

Evidently Merchant recognizes the weakness of his case seeing that he has got to resort to an appeal to our patriotism. Was it patriotism that incited the merchant of a certain district of Kings Co. to form a "ring" for the purpose of keeping the price of potatoes down to 25cts. per bu. during the season just past? Was it patriotism that induced some of the same merchants to send the lowest possible quotations down to Sydney in advance of the cargoes of produce shipped by the Farmer's Institute? Is it patriotism that induces the merchants to import hares, ready-made clothing, tin ware, etc, thus forcing our artisans to go abroad?

Surely Dr. Johnson's definition of patriotism, as "the last refuge of a scoundrel," might be applied to Merchants case, without any wretch to the imagination or violation of the principles of truth. If the present credit system be disadvantageous to the retail merchants why do they encourage it? Denials to the contrary avail but little when proof is so evident. In this section it is practically impossible for the independent farmer, in an average season, to sell the rough products of the farm for cash. Vessels coming here for produce are taken by the merchants and loaded with produce taken for debts, while the farmer, who has no store bills to pay is left with his produce on his hands.

Merchant of Kings Co. having lost part of his trade to the department stores, evidently spends his spare time in solving and propounding conundrums, one of which he gives in his last letter. The solution to the same in a future issue, would be in order as many of your readers are at a loss to understand how Merchant No. 2 stood at the end of the second year, and whether he charged credit prices for goods paid for in advance.
