This diet, same every noon and night, does all very well for a day or two, but after five days I get pretty hungry for good bread and butter and a piece of meat. I'll be heartily glad, too, to get home tomorrow to a comfortable table and chair. On Sunday evening last a young man, middle school graduate, was converted at our Jono-bashi preaching place in this city.

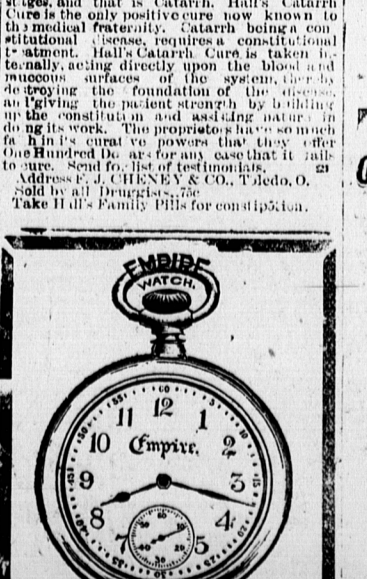
