

Draft Address Debate Closes

Hon. J. P. McIntyre And Mr. Geo. Saville Heard At Tuesday's Session.

Speaking on the Draft Address in the Legislature on Wednesday, Hon. J. P. McIntyre, Minister of Highways and Public Works, recently recovered from a prolonged illness, was received with warm applause. It was not his intention, Mr. McIntyre said, to make a speech at this time. However he could not refrain from complimenting the mover and seconder of the Reply (Messrs Matheson and Klison) a summary of whose speeches he had read in the press, and who, he was told, had acquitted themselves well.

He appreciated very much, he said, the gift of flowers which had been placed on his desk. He had received many such tokens of kindness during his stay in hospital. He also appreciated the fact that his hon. friend, the leader of the Opposition, had received flowers on the opening day of the House, on the occasion of his 60th birthday.

Dr. McIntyre paid warm tribute to the late Senator J. V. Hughes and extended sympathy to his son one of the sitting members for Georgetown. He referred also to the deaths of Mr. Angus McPhee, M. L., and Sir Frederick Banting. He had been ill at home for a week, followed by six weeks in hospital, Mr. McIntyre continued. While in hospital he had been treated by one of the kindest and most devoted physicians in the Maritime Provinces or anywhere else. He referred to the leader of the Opposition, Dr. MacMillan (speaking in his own name), and to the fact that "He and I have differed at times in this House" said Mr. McIntyre; "but I can say safely that I never carried any grudge against the leader of the Opposition or any other member of this House, outside the walls of this building. Dr. MacMillan, who attended me in my illness, used all his great skill and experience, his devotion and kindness in bringing me back to health, which I will never forget. He had a clever young assistant in the person of Dr. Joseph MacMillan, both of them Gold Medalists at McGill University. . . I owe it to Dr. MacMillan that I am standing here today."

Mr. McIntyre thanked the Premier and his cabinet colleagues and other members of the House, for their visits during his illness; also the officials of his own departments. He was contemplating taking two or three weeks' vacation and he knew that his hon. colleague from Moncton (Hon. Mr. Coe) would carry out his duties competently until his return.

Mr. McIntyre lauded the showing made by Premier Campbell at the Ottawa conference on the Stairs Commission report. He had been conspicuous among all the Premiers of Canada. "The others had their briefs prepared but our Premier spoke without a note," he said. He had been acclaimed as one of the ablest men we have in Canada.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "This is the good training we gave him down here."

MR. SAVILLE
The next speaker was Mr. George

E. Saville, 5th King's, who also congratulated the mover and seconder of the Address, and joined in paying tribute to the late Senator Hughes. He recalled the effective speech which obtained Mr. Hughes' nomination as Liberal candidate for the County in the House of Commons. Senator Hughes he said, was "no small-town politician but was able to look at things in a big way." He had used his influence to place a potato warehouse at Georgetown, notwithstanding that his own place of business and residence was at Bourke because he realized that the requirements of the capital of the County should take first place.

Mr. Saville commended the Opposition leader on his able speech. He was glad the latter agreed with Mr. Wendell Willkie that obstruction of international trade was one of the great causes of war.

The condition of our farmers and fishermen said Mr. Saville is very serious. The time had come for plain speaking on this subject. Having had practical experience in both industries, he felt qualified to speak on their behalf. He pictured the worries of the farmer of today with fertilizer notes due, with taxes, school books, clothing and other requirements, and no money to meet them.

"A great many men have honestly tried to seek a remedy but so far I have not heard a solution that is going to offer a great deal of relief," he said. "A little grant here and there is not going to better conditions very much."

He stressed the contrast between the condition of professional men living in the city, and the farmers and fishermen who are not able to afford advanced education for their children. Conditions have changed materially in the last forty or fifty years, to the detriment of the farmer. The financial interests are in part to blame, on account of introduction of the thirty-day system of payments which merchants are required to follow. This means that they have to demand more cash payments from the farmers.

He did not believe that so-called "middle-men" were unnecessary and went on to cite the important functions which each class in the community has to discharge.

The potato industry, he said, has been in a bad condition and one of the reasons is that too many potatoes are grown. If there had been one-quarter fewer potatoes produced last year in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, he believed a good price would have been obtained. Also, there were too many rich men in the potato business, who were engaged in it as speculators to obtain interest on their money. These men, he suggested should invest their money with the Government for the duration of the war.

BARLEY AND GRAIN
The question of imported feed was a difficult one, Mr. Saville said. He believed it would be wiser to subsidize our poorer farmers to

NEW YORK, March 27—(AP)—A little better brand of war news and favorable labor developments apparently imbued stock market buyers with more confidence today and long-lagging industrial leaders were lifted fractions to a point or so.
In the Canadian section International Nickel advanced 1-8 (1/2 point), Imperial Oil dipped the same amount. Other issues were either unchanged or inactive.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks retained a net gain of 2 1/2 points at 41.6. Transfers of 550-1,000 shares compared with 534,020 Wednesday and were the largest since March 10.
Much interest was expressed in the private sale by underwriters after the close of 259,983 shares of Pennsylvania Railroad from British holdings. The stock closed up 1-8 at 24 1-8 and was sold at this quotations.
On the advancing side were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Chrysler, General Motors, U. S. Rubber, Douglas Aircraft, American Telephone, Western Union, Southern Pacific, Savage Arms, N. Y. Shipbuilding, Kennecott, Westinghouse, American Can, Paramount and Bath Iron Works.

MONTREAL, March 27—(CP)—The Yugoslav developments were reflected in a general firming of issues on the stock exchange early today but before the close an irregular tone prevailed in some sections.
Utilities and construction reacted to the change in trend in the most marked degree. Shawinigan sold down to a new low and Bell Telephone was weaker. Quebec Power and Brazilian held early gains. Duceco "B" improved at the opening but relapsed later on. Gypsum held on to a modest advance but Canada Cement preferred lost over a point.
Metals were a consistently strong spot, Noranda and Smelters posting gains, while C.P.R., in rails, clung to a rise all day. Canada Steamships preferred was softer, in carriers, and Price Brothers dropped in papers.
A rarely-traded issue, Anglo-Canadian Telegraph preferred, chalked up the major loss of the session among the miscellaneous stocks and Distillers-Seagram and Imperial Tobacco common were on higher ground.
