

St. F. X. Wins Intercollegiate Rugby Title

Whitlock Sparks Hawks To 14-4 Victory Over Arrows; Beavers Win

MONCTON, Nov. 14 (CP)—Moncton Hawks went seven points ahead of Dartmouth Arrows and Halifax St. Mary's, co-holders of second place, when they defeated Arrows 14-4 in a wide-open Maritime Senior Hockey League battle here Saturday night.

Hawks were masters all the way as they unleashed the heaviest scoring barrage of the season. They took a 4-2 lead in the first period, extended it to 11-4 in the second and added three more in the final period while holding Arrows scoreless.

For coach Les Ramsay and his Hawks it was sweet revenge for the humiliating 8-3 defeat the Moncton squad suffered a week previously at the hands of Arrows on Moncton ice.

Hawks moved to better advantage than they had in any previous game.

Skating fast all the way, their defence, weakest link of the squad in previous games, played a close blocking game, and their attacking lines appeared to have little difficulty solving the Dartmouth defence.

Little Frank Imonti paced the Hawks goal-getting with four tallies, adding to the point total that kept him at the head of the League scorers for the past fortnight. But the shining star in the Hawks attack was swiftness of the puck, last season's scoring champion. He turned in his best performance of the season, sniping three goals and assisting on two others for a total of five points.

CHICAGO, Nov. 14 (CP)—Detroit Red Wings took over the undisputed lead of the National Hockey League tonight with a 3-1 victory over the Chicago Black Hawks before 16,984 fans.

Held to a 2-1 tie at the end of the first period, the Wings connected for the lead goal late in the second period and added the insurance score in the third.

It was fast, bruising game unmarked, however, by any fighting or major penalties, although once referee King Clancy called a triple-minor for high sticking, banishing Bud Polle of Detroit and Bob Goldham and Bep Guidolin of the Hawks simultaneously.

S.D.U. Edged Out 5-3 In Sensational Game Played In Rain Storm

TRURO, N.S., Nov. 14 (Special)—In a sudden death football match which was nothing short of terrific, Saint Francis Xavier University of Antigonish eked out a win over Saint Dunstan's University of Charlottetown here Saturday afternoon by a score of 5-3 to walk off with the Referee Trophy, symbolic of Maritime intercollegiate rugby supremacy.

The game was a titanic struggle all the way, and was played in a downpour of rain which turned the playing field into a veritable mud hole before the game was long underway. But despite the unfavourable conditions, both teams waged a struggle which brought forth a display of football which was sensational and kept the large crowd on their feet roaring with excitement.

The Nova Scotia University won out on the slim margin of two points which were the result of converting their one and only touchdown of the game while the P.E.I. University failed to make their convert good from a very difficult angle after they had scored their only try of the game at the 10-minute mark of the second half.

Big Dunc MacIntyre, captain of the St. F.X. squad did the scoring for the Saints in a nice piece of team play from a scrum on their opponents five yard line, by keeping the ball in the scrum and forcing the Xaverians to punt. The good touch line, with Rodgers falling on the ball, MacMillan, a smooth kicking Saint F.X. half back, made the convert good for the extra points with his Hennesey missing out on the Saint Dunstan's attempt.

St. F.X.'s power-packed three-quarter line had little opportunity to show with the Saints' forwards made only eight resolute, five in the first half and three in the second half.

Meanwhile, S.D.U.'s scrum heeled the ball 20 times in the first half and 16 in the final session. Hennesey and Joey Mahar broke through sporadically for long gains on tricky runs but most of the plays wound up with fumbles.

Despite the fact that the local team lost out in winning honours, they were in such a creditable performance that their story in defeat was almost equal to that of the winning team, with many dying-in-the-wool St. F.X. supporters lauding their opponents for their courage and playing ability.

First Half

In the first half the play remained at centre field for the first ten minutes, with both teams fighting for an opening and players going some terrific tackling in trying to get their backsides into the open for running gains. Only to be brought down in their tracks by the opposing forwards.

Saint F.X. were the first to make the initial opening and get their backfield rolling and pulled some beautiful plays that pulled the boys into their deep into Saint Dunstan's territory with speedy wing half Whelan of St. F.X. spearheading the attack for the Nova Scotia club.

"Windy" LePage and Earl Nicholson led the victorious Millionaires with 16 and 14 points respectively while MacKinnon was the backbone defensively.

G.L. Gillespie and Adrian Peters handled the whistles very effectively calling a total of twelve fouls.
