Says Discretionary Power Vested Under Veterans Land Act

OTTAWA, Oct. 19 — (CP)—In a 1,200-word statement aimed at clearing up "misconceptions" concerning the Government's recent action in limiting small holdings under the Veterans Land Act, Veterans Minister Macdonald today said the director of the Act has been given discretionary powers in dealing with certain cases.

The statement was a reply to criticism by a number of organizations, including the Canadian Legion, of the recent order-in-council increasing the minimum holding from one-half acre to two to three acres.

Mr. Macdonald said that under the discretionary powers the director could, in deserving cases, establish a man on as little as one and six-tenths acres of land, since the powers admitted a 20 per cent leeway.

The Minister, who said he had himself signed the recommendation for the change, stated that due to the acute housing situation a belief had grown up that the small holding provision was a housing measure. Nothing was further from the original concept of the Act and "The Veterans Land Act is exactly what the name implies."

Original concept of the Act was that a small holding would be a "small rural establishment where a veteran could add to his income and to his living from the production of his own land. I think it will be agreed that a half-acre of land does not offer this possibility."

He added that the Veterans Department might be responsible for the misconception, since, to ease the housing shortage, it had built 3,000 homes on half-acre plots and authorized purchase of rural properties on half-acre plots.

broken what was believed to be a widespread scheme of blackmarket selling of Canadian game and fish in meat-short United States markets.

Game warden J.D. McPaul, acting on instructions from Quebec City, said hundreds of jack lights and other illicit equipment had been seized. To bear out his statement that the wholesale slaughtering of game had been stopped, he said the toll of moose had been reduced from 800 last year to 175 in 1946.

With headquarters in this Guelph Valley town some 100 miles north of Ottawa, McPaul ranges his 75,000 square miles of rustic, game-rich territory by boat and car, sometimes by plane, sometimes by Siberian sled dogs.

At Roddick Lake, familiarly known as Big Round Lake, game officials recently seized 200 pounds of fish from four men who were operating with a Coleman lamp and shears and taking huge hauls of trout from the water. Fines of \$200 each were assessed. Not only was the spearing by jacklight highly illegal but the trout season was closed at the time the seizure was made.

McPaul told of scores of seizures which he had made of jack light equipment this year. In his garage were exhibited high powered light equipment, illegal revolvers, spears and other equipment taken from hunters and fishermen.

The seizures have brought many protests from the hunters involved, some of them carrying their pro-

tests to the United States Embassy in Ottawa, McPaul said. In some instances where the parties have proved no attention to jacklight game and given satisfactory excuses, fines have been eliminated and the equipment returned. But for the most part the convictions have been upheld.

Many United States parties who were stopped and relieved of jack lights had driven into Canada, with fully-equipped camping outfits and food supplies.

They were not spending any money in Canada, McPaul said, and they were caught 35 miles from the nearest town carrying huge lighting equipment that could only have one purpose—jacking of moose and deer.

Dozens of seizures have been made at the entrance to Mount Laurier Park in the heart of the moose country. How much game was smuggled out of the district in trucks without being declared at all is not known. But, McPaul said, large amounts of moose, deer, and fish have been exported under the guise of game being taken back by successful sportsmen.
