Another all-star game has gone into the records for the American League after the 12-0 pasting of the National League yesterday. It was indeed a black day for Charlie Grimm's crew as the Yankees' lineup displayed all their vaunted batting power spearheaded by slugging Teddy Williams' two circuit swashes. To climax their sparkling performance the American League got the best pitching from their star pitcher, the Bobbly Feller, a Prince Hal Newhouse. It was the thirteenth renewal of the classic rivalry held in Chicago in 1933 by Arlo Wood.

Tuesday's victory was the ninth for the American League against the National League in 1946. The National League scored their first shutout in 1940 with Bill McKechnie doing the managing when they registered a 4-0 victory. Great performances by their name players have been largely responsible for the American League's victory in the yearly classic. Bobby Doerr's home run was the big blast in the 1946 victory in 1946 while Ted Williams ninth inning homer won the 1941 game 7-5.

He plays second base for the Montreal Royals and, for our money, he's a very good second baseman. When Robinson came to the Royals a few months ago he came into the game with all eyes focused upon him. He was the first Negro ever to be admitted into class "Double A" baseball.

"In that respect," he has proved himself to be a credit to his race and a credit to baseball. We can recall that the first appearance of the players and Southern scribes predicted that he wouldn't last through one complete trip around the league. Well, he has fooled them, and it looks as if his next step is into the Big League uniform. It is that some hot-headed Southern pitcher would beat him when he stepped up to the plate. They said that he couldn't hit International League pitching because he was too loosey-goosey at the plate. To put it briefly, they said that he wasn't a baseball player of International League calibre.

"Well, he has fooled them. He's very close to the top of the International League batting averages. In addition, in a recent game he made a play that was sensational. With a man on base in the ninth inning, Ben Drake hit a ball that was labelled for a single into right field. Robinson had no right to be close to the ball but he scurried out to field it. He leaped it with his glove and juggled it into the air. With the greatest grace he caught it in his bare right hand. It was a tremendous play and it ended the game.

"On Saturday night, for the first time, we heard a white ball player give Robinson the credit to which he is due. Herb Grump-ton, a gentleman who played for the New York Yankees last season was sitting in the stands, just before leaving in a taxi. A great ball player, he said, "A great ball player—but it's bad that he's black. We hope to live to see the day when Robinson's critics give him his due without mentioning his pigmentation."

Joe Mahar Beaten By One Stroke As Golf Tourney Ends

(By The Canadian Press) ST. ANDREWS, N. B., July 10.—R. H. Harley, Moncton, became New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island amateur golf champion today with a one-stroke margin over Joe Mahar, Charlottetown, and David Caughy, St. Andrews.

Harley carded 79 for the last 18 holes of the three-day hole competition. His total was 237 against 238 for Mahar and Caughy. The open and professional crowns, as expected, went to Archie Skinner, pro of the Algonquin Club here, who led the field all the way. He shot a par 71 today and finished with a total of 211.

The defending pro champion, Cecil Manuge of the Ken-Wo Club in Nova Scotia, needed 83 to get around the whole course and ended fourth among the pros with a 54-hole total of 242. Don Sinclair, Riverside, N. B., had 234 for second place and Ollie Breatuit, Amherst was third with 240.

Boyd Britton, Vancouver, amateur and open winner last year, did not defend the titles. Charlottetown players were prominent among the amateurs. M. J. Dowling was only one stroke away from the second-place Mahar and Caughy, while Bill Beer finished next with 241. Dowling, a former pro had asked for amateur status for the tournament but his request was finally turned down before the start of the third round.

Dowling's leadership among the amateurs for the first 18 holes was taken over yesterday by Mahar, who finished the second 18 with a one-stroke margin over Dowling, Beer and K.M. Ross, St. Andrews. Mahar had asked for amateur status for the tournament but his request was finally turned down before the start of the third round.

Today Harley's 79 was good enough for a final margin of one stroke over Mahar and Caughy, who carded 82 and 78 respectively. When the last round started Caughy was 10th in the amateur field but his 78 today was eclipsed only by Skinner's 71.
