Press Club Addressed By Pres. Coolidge

(Special to the Guardian) WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The imposing new building of the National Press Club was dedicated by President Coolidge last night with an address in which he urged American newspapers to cooperate with the government in international affairs. "Whenever any of the press of our country undertakes to exert their influence in behalf of foreign interests," President Coolidge said, "the candor of the situation would be greatly increased if their foreign connections were publicly disclosed. All public business should be publicly conducted."

Speaking as a member of the club the president restated his belief that one of the greatest safeguards of official integrity is publicity and he charged the newspapers of the country with the task of disclosing interests represented by those who

seek dispensations from the government. Foreign interests the president said, have the privilege of being represented in the United States and their right to fair treatment is acknowledged.

"But," he added, "when foreign governments are represented here their agents are required to come publicly accredited and be publicly reported. For generations our law has forbidden our own citizens entering into any negotiations with a foreign government concerning its relations with our own government. Such negotiations can be carried on only under the direction of the people.

The press however, should not only be fair, Mr. Coolidge said, but it should remember in its criticism that there is a need for discrimination. Constant attacks upon the administration of public affairs, the operation of commercial enterprises, the conduct of social life and the fomenting of class distinctions and jealousy he said, disintegrates the spirit of patriotism.

PROHIBITION STILL INDUSTRY

Law Enforcement items from the great city of Baltimore, as set forth by celebrated Sunpaper:

"Lightning struck a barn in the rear of an untenanted estate at Elsinore avenue and Old Frederick road last night, setting fire to the structure and destroying a 1,000-gallon still. Police from Catonsville and firemen from Catonsville and Baltimore city, summoned by neighbors, found the barn in flames and Angelo Calle butting his head against the stone wall of a building. As it was apparent that Calle would kill himself unless stopped, he was forced to desist. In the ruins of the barn was found the most elaborate still ever seized in Baltimore county, according to the police. A sixteen-pound boiler and fifty barrels of mash also were found. Calle denied any knowledge of them.

"Shoppers in Hollis Market were startled late in the afternoon by an explosion in the 1100 block of Hollis street. Investigation by the police and firemen revealed an exploded still in the second story of 1114 Hollis street. The explosion loosened the rear wall from its supports and firemen prepared last night to tear it down. Besides the ruins of a fifty-gallon still, Federal dry agents seized and destroyed fifteen barrels of mash, one barrel of alcohol and twenty gallons of corn liquor, according to their report. The building was untenanted."

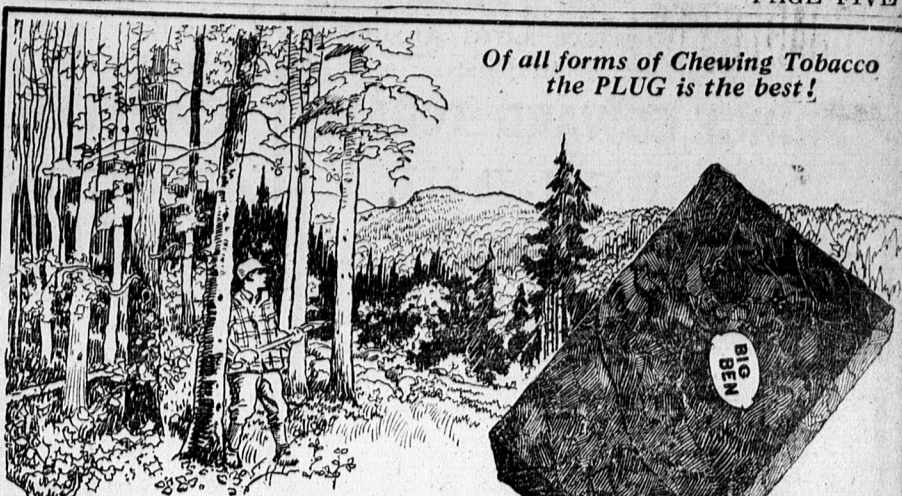
The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m., from the United Church to the family vault in the city cemetery.

Business was opened in River street east and subsequently moved to more commodious quarters in the same street, and later the partnership was dissolved and Mr. McLeod established himself on River street west. During the Riel Rebellion when danger threatened Prince Albert, he served as a member of the town council. Closely interested in municipal, provincial and political matters he soon took an active part in public life. In 1894 he was elected to a four-year term as mayor of Prince Albert, a position of long connection with the municipal government as councillor, alderman, and 25 years later, mayor again.

Enters Parliament In 1899 his experience of government extended into a wider sphere, for he was elected to represent East Prince Albert as member of the Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories. Prince Albert had two members then, the late West Prince Albert, Mr. McLeod retained his seat until redistribution amalgamated the Prince Albert constituencies. Mr. McLeod was a Liberal in politics and fearless in the exposition of his party's policies. In 1917 he contested the Prince Albert seat in the Liberal interest against Andrew Knox running as a Unionist, and was defeated. In 1920 he was a member of the census commission known as the half-breed script commission. Later he relinquished his sheep business and formed the well-known realty firm of S. and W. R. McLeod.
