ELECTED JUDGES.

Judges of the Supreme Court in New York City are elected to their positions for a term of 14 years and receive salaries of \$17,500 each, which salary is much higher than that of the judges of the Supreme Court of the United States. In Canada and throughout the British Empire the elective principle has not been applied in the judiciary, appointment by the Government being preferred.

Under the most favorable conditions either system may work well. We are not of those who think the best choice is always made by the appointing power, but in Canada it has given us judges who have been in the main high-minded, capable and just, and who have been respected by all creeds and classes. From some words publicly uttered by District Attorney Jerome in New York recently we are left to infer that the elective system in operation there is far from satisfactory.

Mr. Jerome was speaking at a banquet and said in part: "I am a lawyer and I was trained in my profession to regard the judiciary with a degree of reverence. I want to say that, with a few exceptions, I not only have no reverence for many of the justices of the Supreme Court who sit in this department, but for most of them I have not even ordinary decent respect." Few of the lawyers practising in the New York courts would care to publicly speak so plainly, or would dare to do so if they honestly felt as Mr. Jerome does.

But Mr. Jerome had reasons for his want of respect. "When a judge of the Supreme Court has to go to Charley Murphy, a common bartender, and plead to be elevated to a position to pass on our lives, our liberties and our property, it is something for the bar to think about," he said. It was the same under a previous Tammany regime, when another member of the bar expressed his disgust on seeing one of the judges of New York's highest court "spring like a locust to assist Dick Croker on with his overcoat."

But this is not the worst of the elective system as it is worked out under the management of the political boss. The candidate for a judgeship must first of all purchase his nomination by a big contribution to the election fund. His election is characterized by all the bribery, corrupt practices, personation, perjury and fraud incident to the election of a Mayor or Member of Congress. The judge thus elected is and remains a party man. And he may still carry on outside business as before. He may be a director in an insurance company or a trust company and derive a large income from doubtful services rendered outside of his work as judge.

In the recent insurance inquiry it was disclosed that one of the New York Supreme Court judges, whose brother is a president of one of the scandalised companies, has shared in the profit of one of its secret and shady transactions. Another of these judges was the subject of open criticism for acting as an official of one of the trust contracting companies that have dealings with the city. Of course, not all of these evils are necessarily the fruits of the elective system. There may be great abuses under the best system of appointing judges. The Supreme Court of the United States is an appointed body, but the appointments are virtually made to these positions by the state bosses. Thus the trail of the serpent of partyism and bossism is over the entire judiciary.

SUNDAY DELIVERY.

There is some agitation at present in favor of withdrawing the privilege which the holders of the post office boxes have long enjoyed of entering the main hall of the post office and removing their letters on Sunday. The question arises, is the going to the post office for letters such a work of necessity or mercy as comes within what is permissible on a Sabbath-observing community? Ordinarily it is not, and so far as business letters are concerned it is not. But there are many hundreds of letters which are not of this class. There are letters from sick or distressed relatives abroad, summoning dear ones to their side. There are letters announcing the death of dear ones, and urgently requiring immediate attention, as to funeral arrangements, &c. (It is estimated that on an average three or four Islanders die abroad each week of the year and about two a week have their bodies sent home for interment.)

These and other cases call for the promptest access to the mails, especially when the mail from the mainland is often received here too late on Saturday night to be sorted and delivered the same evening. It must be remembered that a letter delivered Monday morning is too late to be answered, or for a person summoned away to take the first train in the morning. And also that in the winter season our mails are so intermittent, so often and so long delayed that it is very painful for one in an emergency not to be able to get a letter which he is morally certain is lying in the Post Office from Saturday night till Monday morning. These are matters to be considered. The Guardian stands for the observance of the Sabbath, but has doubts upon the question of withdrawing a privilege so long enjoyed and which is partly at least based upon considerations of humanity and necessity.

Presumably the short loan is made because the New Brunswick Government like our own has hopes of something from the fishery claim, or from increased subsidies in the not distant future.


