THE KIRK PULPIT
 Preaching yesterday morning, the Minister, Rev. T.H. Scmers said: "There is your definition of sin. Oh I know there are official ones. Any transgression of or want of conformity unto, the law of God," and so on. Here, however, is your definition of sin—the failure to be obedient to the heavenly vision, to live up to what you see, to act in accordance with the revelation made to you. When a man sees something, and then betrays it, ignores it, forgets it, lets it go—that is sin. When he realizes the antiquity, fellowship, moral adjustment, and personal benefit of churchgoing, and talks nonsense, the sheer and utter nonsense, about "getting more good elsewhere," though he knows, or should know, that "getting" is not the most important aspect of life, he sins. When he imagines that he can go to church occasionally, instead of regularly, when, all the time, he sees that only habit is obedience and that, if he does not form one habit, he will fallibly form other and worse habits, he sins. Many a splendid character has missed fruition because someone else with perhaps less charm, managed to do the things he saw. George Eliza, both gave three million acres of land in North America to Sir Philip Sidney whose beautiful character is one of the gems in English history. He did nothing with them. It is William Penn's statue which stands on the City Hall in Philadelphia, and, while Penn was by no means the ignoble person that Macaulay makes him, he had not the graces of Sidney. On the other hand, he obeyed what he saw and made his place for ever.

Non-Confidence Motion Puts Some Members On Spot

 OTTAWA, April 10 - (CP) - Liberal and Progressive Conservative members have been put on a spot by the C.C.F. non-confidence motion on the Government's action on freight rates.

The motion has caught many members from the Maritimes, the Prairie Provinces and British Columbia in a cleft stick.

Liberals from these areas are faced with the choice of sticking with the Government on a non-confidence motion that might overthrow it or aligning themselves with their Provincial Governments, who are in direct opposition.

And five of the seven Provincial Governments in the donnybrook are Liberal.

Some of the Progressive Conservative members are on an equally warm spot, but with the heat coming from a different direction.

These are the P.C.'s from the Maritimes and the West. Their party in general endorses the idea that the railways should have "adequate" revenues.

If they vote with the general party stand, their constituents may not like it. But if they vote the other way, they will be getting themselves in hot water partywise, with an election coming up in the next year or so.

The C.C.F. and the Social Credit group, it was expected, would vote solidly for the C.C.F. motion declaring non-confidence in the Government for failing to defer the 21-per-cent rate increase granted the railways last week.

Gordon Innor, veteran Liberal from Halifax, who has always voted on the side of the Government, is put on the spot as he has been complaining of the award.

How they and other Liberal members will vote on the non-confidence motion, which pits them for or against the Government on the 21-per-cent issue, remains a question.

Approved In Principle Federal Labor Code

OTTAWA, April 10 - (CP) - depute such as last year's country-wide strike in the meat-packing industry.
