EMPIRE LODGE No. 19 of the Knights of Pythias intends celebrating the 42nd Natal day of the Order by a ball and whist party in the Pythian Castle Hall in Charlottetown, tonight. The Order of the Knights of Pythias was founded on the 19th day of January A. D. 1861, in the City of Washington, D. C., by Justin H. Rathbone and some friends as a monument to the world famous story of Damon and Pythias. From its institution the Order has grown rapidly and at the end of the year 1904 there were in existence 7354 lodges of the Order with a total membership of 232,406 Knights. Empire Lodge was the first introduction of the Order into Prince Edward Island. It was organized on the evening of the 7th day of December 1890 by a delegation of Knights from St. John, New Brunswick. Since its organization Empire Lodge has firmly established itself among the societies of the city as a social and fraternal power and the entertainments given by it from time to time are always remembered as happy recollections and looked forward to with most pleasant anticipation. Since the organization of Empire Lodge the membership of the order has become upwards of one hundred and ninety-five in the Province. Crescent Lodge No. 24 was organized in Summerside on the 8th October 1900.

CONCILIATION IN IRELAND

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Mr. William O'Brien, the Irish member of parliament, today said a peaceful revolution is going on in Ireland. The policy of conciliation, he said, is now almost universally accepted by the Nationalists, including the Orange democracy. The change had not attracted much attention in England, but every one in Ireland knows the change has taken place. The recent victory in West Belfast, Mr. O'Brien said, was won only through the assistance of Protestant workmen, and the growing alliance between the Nationalists and Unionists of Ireland is acknowledged not only by Mr. John Redmond, but those who a few months ago conscientiously opposed the policy of conciliation.
