A TEACHERS' INSTITUTE, which promises to be very successful, was organized at Little River, on Tuesday, Jan. 30th. Percy Sterns, teacher at Little River, was appointed chairman of the meeting. The following officers were elected: President, Grace L. Gordon, Annandale; Vice-President, Joseph Steele, Little Pond; Sec'y Treasurer, Ada Underhay, Bay Fortune. The Institute meets on Wednesday evening of each week in the school house at Little River.

THE meeting of Excelsior Farmers' Institute in York Hall Saturday evening was well attended. Peter Brodie presided, and Mr. Essery, of Union, read a paper on "The Tariff as it affected the farmer." Pres. Brodie advocated raising the duties on American farm products that are sold in Canada in competition with the products of the Canadian farmer. The following table from the trade returns of 1904 shows how the Americans are capturing the Canadian market.

The next meeting of the Institute takes place at Pleasant Grove Hall, Feb. 17, when poultry and dairying will be discussed.

THE members of the Mock Parliament at St. Dunstan's College met for the third time on Thursday evening Feb. 1st. The bill respecting Capital Punishment was read the third time and passed. Hon. Joseph E. Gillis, Minister of Public Works then opened the discussion on the Resolution appropriating \$5,000,000 yearly for ten consecutive years for the building of a Canadian Navy and demonstrated what a crying need there is here for a navy to protect our interests and assist the Imperial fleet in time of war. He was ably supported by Premier Cahill, Hon. Messrs. Hughes (Hamilton), Gillis (Calgary), Mooney (Osham), and Gillis (Montreal). Mr. Bradley, the leader of the Opposition, strenuously opposed the resolution, claiming that it would be more in accordance with the eternal fitness of things for the House to supply the necessities for public life before attempting to add luxuries to it. He maintained that the undeveloped condition of the country at present would not justify the voting of millions of dollars for naval purposes. The leader of the opposition was supported by Messrs. McIntyre (Edmonton), Larkins (Belleville), Quinn (Halifax) and McKenna (Toronto). On a division of the House the resolution was carried on strictly party principles. The House was then prorogued by the Governor General and according to the constitution the Opposition members will be called upon to form a new Government for Thursday Feb. 8th.

HOW IS THIS

The writer knows of a dealer in a small town in Western Ontario who recently closed the sale of a piano to a well-to-do farmer for \$100, a duplicate of which he sold not a month previously for \$175, and made a good profit. In both cases the sales were for cash. This instance is doubtless as exceptional as it is true, but it represents a condition of which the buyer may be the victim if he is not sharp. The dealer referred to above is selling second-hand instruments for new, every time he can make the purchaser believe his lies. The particular instrument he sells may be as good, second or third hand, as when new, but his customers are gradually becoming wise to his misrepresentations with the result that the piano he represents is in bad odor with many in the community, and will become more so; the dealer having no thought nor regard for the future of his own or the piano's future. It is absurd to think that the manufacturer is not cognizant of the methods of this particular dealer, and why he allows him to continue is a source of wonder to the dealer's neighbors and perhaps to himself.—Canadian Music and Trades Journal.
