She had been married two and a half years and leaves a bright little boy but fifteen months old in addition to an infant son. Mrs. True and her husband visited here last June, spending two weeks at her home where she was such a favorite. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Rackham and family, especially as their sore and sudden bereavement has come at such an unexpected and otherwise joyous time of year. Five sisters survive, including Misses Minnie, Clara and Lucy at home, Mrs. Spurgeon Warren, North River, and Miss Elythe at present in Pinehurst, North Carolina.
