LETTERS received from Avon Saxon, who visited Charlottetown some time ago show that his recent tour in South Africa with the Imperial Concert Company was a success, although they had some unique experiences in that war-cursed country. It was almost a coincidence that the company came home in the union line steamer Saxon. Mr. S. had contracted enteric fever in Lady-smith, where the company gave a concert, which fever developed on the passage to England, but he soon recovered from its effects and just before starting on his Australian tour he weighed 220 lbs. The Imperial Concert Company as it started on its Australian tour is composed of seven persons.

THE well known evangelists, with the women of Chatham assisting them, edited a special edition of the Chatham Daily Banner News. Hunter and Crossley have been in Chatham for several weeks. They have been successful in their revival efforts, and at the suggestion of the Banner News took control of the business and editorial policy of that paper for one day, April 4. The ladies' assisting society of the Public General Hospital acted as office and editorial staffs. The entire proceeds of this venture, which is managed by Mrs. S. T. Martin, the wife of one of Chatham's most prominent citizens, will go to the Public General Hospital. The Maple Leaf City's society leaders became editors, reporters and took charge of departments as in a metropolitan daily. M. S. E. W. Seane and Mrs. S. F. Gardiner were respectively managing and city editors. All sporting news was published except prize fighting. The paper had a circulation of 5,000.

At a meeting of the new managing committee of the Wanderers A. A. C. Wednesday evening, the following was decided upon:—It was brought to the notice of the committee that the amateur athletic championships are to take place at Buffalo, June 14, 15, and 16, about two months earlier than usual, as Maxey, Long, Duffy and all the present champions intend leaving for England in July. Trainer Mack does not close his present engagement at Orono, Me., until next month, and would therefore not have much time in which to train Frank Stephen for the championships. It was suggested that Frank might exercise on the Wanderers' track until the time of Mack's release from the Boston engagement, when the runner might go to Boston and meet him and train there or at Buffalo for a few weeks. The matter was left to the sports committee and L. M. Johnston, of the cricket committee.—Halifax Chronicle.

The New Glasgow Bulletin says: Word was received here on Thursday of the death of Arthur McWilliams at Sydney, from pneumonia. His mother had gone down previously to see him. Mr. McWilliams was a trusted employee of the Electric Light Company, while he lived here, and left here about a year ago to fill a good situation in Sydney. He was well liked by all who knew him; honest, faithful, industrious, and good living—he was a young man that gave much promise. McWilliams was a native of Belfast, P. E. I. The flag of Norton Lodge, I. O. O. F., was flying half-mast out of respect to the deceased, who was a member of "the order of the three links." [The remains were brought over by the Princess on Saturday evening and according to directions given by a delegation of Oddfellows' remains were conveyed to the Oddfellows' Hall. The body was taken to Belfast yesterday. The mother and brother of the deceased accompanied the remains.
