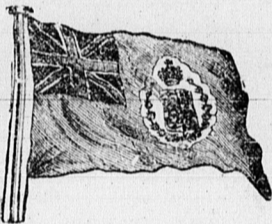

SHOULD GERMANY WIN?

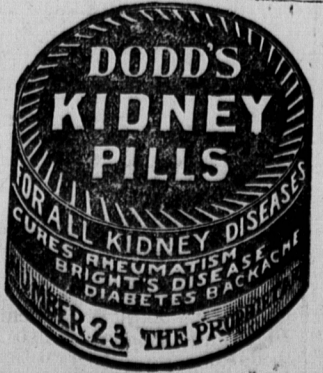
A century ago Napoleon, says The Times, achieved the hegemony of Europe. He bent every nation, but that of England, to his sway. He reconstructed the map; erected or destroyed dynasties and stalked across Europe like a demigod, at whose approach the mightiest trembled, at whose dread name fractious children were lulled to sleep.

Before his death, at St. Helena, Europe had craved every impression he had made; and of his life work there remained but the ghostly memories of the innocent blood he had shed in such engorged abundance. The German Kaiser has found the propitious moment, when, as he thinks, he may consummate the ambition he has nursed since boyhood. Filled with a sombre enthusiasm nursed by the belief that he is God's chosen instrument, it has been his supreme trial to restrain his desire to dash his mailed fist in the face of Europe, over which his avowed mission to set up his military and feudal dominion, of which the genius is the unquestioning submission of the people to the will of the over-lord. That great swash-buckler, Frederick the Great, has been his model. Napoleon he could not love or imitate, at least; and besides, in the case of the Kaiser, it is not so much a matter of personal glory, as the imposition of a vast and implacable system, which denies individual volition, keeps the intellect in swaddling clothes; and threatens the common life with armed men, who lope and creep like the side-walk, and shoot them down like dogs, should resentment be expressed. It is this system which 62,000,000 German people have accepted, inured, as they are, to military despotism, and never having tasted the larger freedom which has made England the model of the world. This is the rule which would be imposed upon Europe should Germany win out in the present struggle. The imposition of an iron military despotism which would deny human volition and impend over every community like a sinister and oppressive shadow; a setting up all over the world of a vast, bureaucratic system which would throttle every free aspiration, quench every political or spiritual ardor, reduce every expression to that prescribed by military formula; pattern the general life after the barrack room; and give to millions the constant notion, which the later generations would transmit, that the highest sanctions in life were consecrated in the drill sergeant. If Germany wins, then modern Europe may bid a long farewell to liberty.

Every country which pays tribute to Germany as a result of a victorious war will be an appendage of a vast military establishment, which, unchallenged for generations, will crush out the free life of subject peoples.

English liberty which, throughout a far-flung empire, made life large and precious, and to which the modern European world was so happily approximating, as offering the largest measure of human freedom, compatible with order and regularity, would be throttled; and England, a vassal state, would sink into the insignificance of an out-lying province of the world-empire, compared with which Rome was slight and transitory.

Nor is this extravagant fancy. It is the literal fact, which would instantly supervene upon her triumph of Germany in this vast contest, in which the stake is the most precious that could engage the purpose or ardor—human liberty. For these reasons it behoves every subject of the far-flung British Empire to do his utmost endeavor to maintain it in its integrity—conscious that it is the greatest moral and spiritual asset in the world.

MR. MICHAEL MALONE.

Prince Edward Island was saddened on July 28th, by the sudden death of Michael Malone, one of the oldest and most respected residents of Queen's County, having spent more than three score and ten of his years on the Melville Road. He had endeared himself to all he came in contact with and the summons of the Almighty coming suddenly as it did on the above date, threw South Melville and the surrounding communities into gloom, and grief to the family and neighbors who survived him. Born seventy-nine years and ten months ago Mr. Malone, located in South Melville soon became one of the most prosperous farmers in the central part of the Island. By his genial and kindly disposition and his deep interest in his fellow-man coupled with his thorough knowledge of agriculture, it was not long before his advice was sought by many engaged in the tillage of the soil or those contemplating the purchase of land. Many today located in its midst owe their success to his keen knowledge of Island affairs and the advice given by him as to the best methods of procedure. Indeed, up to and even on the day of his death, he was called upon for his opinion by

those who today mourn his loss.

A man of most powerful physique and keen intellect Mr. Malone would have been a prominent figure in any walk of life. He was a most entertaining conversationalist and his reminiscences of this Island during his days of infancy was sufficient to always keep his listeners interested. Built like a hercules he was of a most commanding figure and carried the dignity of all whom he met. In the full vigor of his manhood on the morning of his death, he left his house and directed certain improvements that he was making on his land. After directing the method of the work he complained of feeling somewhat tired and retired to the house and going to his room reclined upon a couch. Closing his eyes as though to sleep and with his hands clasped upon his breast he awaited the call that in time all must hear, and with a smile upon his features and a gentle sigh he passed to the great beyond. Sudden as has been the summons and without any complaint or indication from him that the end was so nigh it is to be wondered unless by a direction of Providence that his children hastened to his side and were with him when he breathed his last.

Scarcely had he passed away when the neighbors of his life time began to flock to his late home and offered their condolence and services to his bereaved family.

Two days thereafter and on the 30th, day of July from St. Joseph's Church at Kelly's Cross, after funeral services conducted by Reverend Father Kiggins all that was mortal of Michael Malone was laid to rest while prayers for the repose of his soul were wafted to Heaven by his relatives and neighbors most of whose eyes were dimmed with tears. As he lived he died loved by all, was a remark made by one of the mourners, while another was heard to say after the grave had been filled and with bowed heads his neighbors were about to depart; there he is "the most noble Roman of us all." Among those present and who officiated as pallbearers were—Hugh McKenna Francis Monaghan, James Malone.

It was with a heavy heart that his children after the funeral wended their way home. They realized too well that the father whom they so dearly loved had gone from them forever, and the voice they so loved to hear was forever silenced. That when the winds of winter would blow, and the snows of the north begin to be felt that the warmth of the heart that was with them from their childhood had forever ceased to beat. They will think of him in the day and will look for him at night, and the vacant chair at their table can never be filled. They must console themselves forever with the knowledge that God's will must be done.

The children surviving are Peter Malone, John Malone, and Miss Byna Malone, of South Melville; Miss Regina Malone, of Haverhill, Mass., and Mrs. Thomas C. McDonald, of New York; Edward Malone, of Boston, and Mrs. James Kelleher, of Haverhill, Mass.; George Malone, of Yonkers, New York, and Joseph Malone, of New York City; all of whom were present at the time of their father's death.

A loving one from them has gone. A voice they loved is stilled; A place is vacant in their hearts, Which never can be filled. (Examiner and Patriot please copy.)
