On Trial For Murder of Baby

ST. ANDREWS, N. B., Oct. 16.—Testifying today on her own behalf at the trial Mrs. Louise Matthews was charged with murdering her infant child by throwing its body into the St. Croix River. Mrs. Matthews declared that Albert Robinson at whose home she was staying, told her he drowned her baby. According to the defendant Robinson said he did not want the baby at his home or anything belonging to John Fitzmaurice, who been accused by Robinson of the baby's paternity. She admitted she knew of a lead pipe and wire being in the Robinson house but she did not have anything to do with placing them on the body or drowning it. A sensation occurred in the court room during the day when Mrs. Mary S. Fox of Calais, Me., who was called as witness by Attorney General Byrne, fainted on the stand on being shown garments of the dead baby. The trial was interrupted until medical aid was restored to the witness. Mrs. Fox identified the clothing found on the dead infant, the clothing having been made by her daughter.

Bonnie Dell Won The Feature Race

Horse Driven by Amateur Owner Captured Grand Circuit Event After Four Stiff Heats

LEXINGTON, Ky., October 15.—The Ashland Stake for 2 1/2 trotters, the feature of today's Grand Circuit programme, was won by Bonnie Dell, driven by his amateur owner, Thomas G. Hinds, after four stiff heats in which three different trotters had taken records of 2:05 or better.

The opening race of the card, the 2:13 pace, was hardly more than a procession, with Crystal Knight easily best.

The 2:09 pace was a better race. Jay Brook took the opening heat in 2:03 1/4 from Captain Mack, but the former California pacer was best in the next two. In place of the two year old trot, which had but two to go, a 2:07 trot was given with four starters. This race went to Harvest Tide. Summaries:

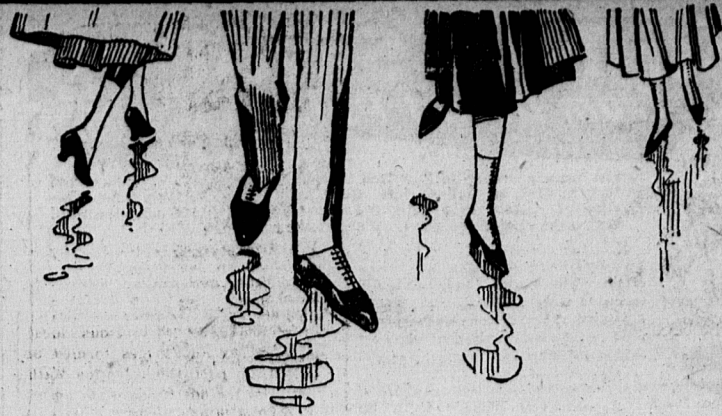

No Political Office For C. N. R. Men

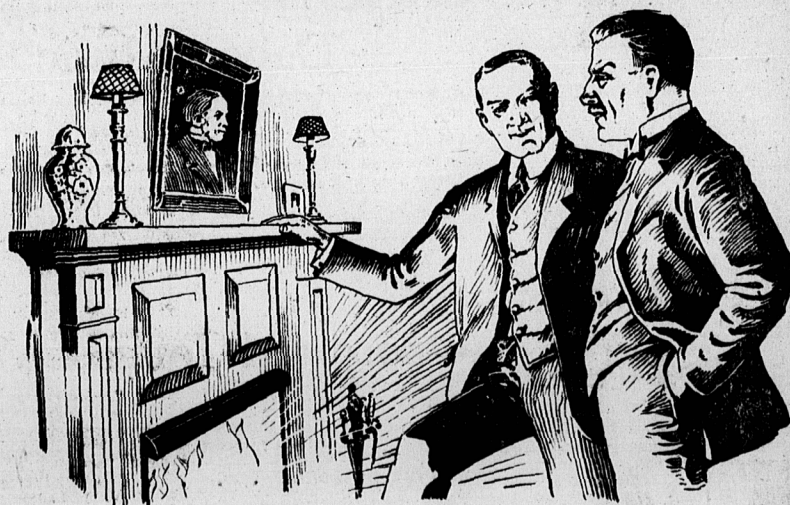
WINNIPEG, Oct. 16.—Announcement is made by President D. B. Hanna of the Canadian National Railways, that employees of the system would not be allowed to run for political office on penalty of being dismissed. This aroused storm indignation and protest at the morning session of the division of Labor which is in convention or railroad employees to press to the limit the cancellation of this order, for which they say they see no adequate reason.

Premier Can Not Take Action

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—Premier Meighen yesterday afternoon told a delegation of the citizens League, which waited on him in hope of having the Dominion Government take action to prevent the meeting at Ottawa of the Self Determination League for Ireland on Saturday and Sunday, that Dominion Government could not constitutionally take any action in the matter unless required to do so by the Provincial Government.

OTTAWA, Oct. 16.—Mr. George Boyce, M.P. intimated to the Prime Minister that Carleton County was considerably stirred up over contemplated meeting and that if it was held, several thousand residents of the County intended coming to the Capital and stage counter demonstrations regarding the statement that Attorney General Rancey declined to interfere. The Premier said it must be because he is not satisfied that the meeting

will be one which will come under definition of an unlawful assembly under the criminal code. We have our part of the constitution to administer and cannot and will not impose our authority in a manner which appertains to the municipal or provincial authorities. You may rest assured that our services should be required, we shall be ready to act.
