

Crop Reports

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its branches. The Branch Managers have completed and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL.

Crops in the Prairie Provinces continue to make satisfactory progress under ideal weather conditions. Damage from pests continues negligible and no further important hail losses are reported. In a few previous years the outlook has been as promising as at this date. In Quebec crops are progressing well but dry weather is needed. In Ontario the weather has been unfavorable during the week, frequent rains interfering with the completion of harvesting of the fall wheat and causing some sprouting in grain already in stock. In the Maritime Provinces growing conditions in general continue to be most favorable. In British Columbia conditions continue very favorable and shipments of early fruits are going forward.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES.

ALBERTA WESTERN AND NORTHEASTERN AREAS. The situation is very favorable. Crops are in excellent condition. Light rains have been beneficial. ALBERTA SOUTHEASTERN AREA. Conditions continue very favorable. Prospects are satisfactory and a good crop seems assured. SASKATCHEWAN NORTHERN AREA. Crops are progressing satisfactorily and filling well. Prospects continue favourable and wheat cutting should be under way in most districts in 10 to 15 days. SASKATCHEWAN SOUTHERN AREA. Grains are filling under favourable conditions. Wheat cutting in general is expected to commence in 10 days. MANITOBA. The weather is favourable for filling grains. The cutting of rye and barley is under way and wheat cutting should be general in 10 days. Prospects are satisfactory.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Haymaking in most districts has been interrupted by recent heavy rain-falls. The crop is a good average. Oats are making good progress. Other grains are in satisfactory condition. Potatoes and root crops continue to show good progress. Pastures generally are in good condition. Small fruits are plentiful. Orchard conditions are moderately good. Tobacco has been retarded by wet weather and in some sections has suffered damage.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

Barley and oats are heavy crops but hail and strong winds have resulted in some lodging. A large amount of barley has been cut and oats will be ready next week. Owing to rains a substantial portion of late hay has spoiled and will be left in the fields. Corn is doing well but requires dry weather. Root crops are making good growth. Apples, peaches and pears are a good average crop while small fruits, especially raspberries, are plentiful. Tobacco growth is pronounced and beans are doing well. Pasturage is excellent. Warm dry weather is urgently needed.

MARITIME PROVINCES.

A good to above average hay crop of good quality is being cut. Potato plants continue to show strong growth with no sign of rust. Oats promise well. A heavy drop of apples is reported, bringing the prospective yield down to 850,000 barrels or 75% of the five year average. It is however still expected that the fruit will be of high grade. Grass pasture is in excellent condition.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Thrashing of grains has commenced and above average yields are reported. Roots are doing well but moisture would be beneficial. Apples estimate at 115% of average, are now sizing rapidly and are comparatively free from blemish. Peaches are estimated to yield 100%, pears and plums of excellent quality, 80%, plums and prunes 90%, hops going forward. Pasture 60%. Heavy shipments of peaches but rains are required.
