CANON TROOP'S LECTURES.—In yesterday's report of Rev. Canon Troop's lecture on the Jews, a minor error crept in. 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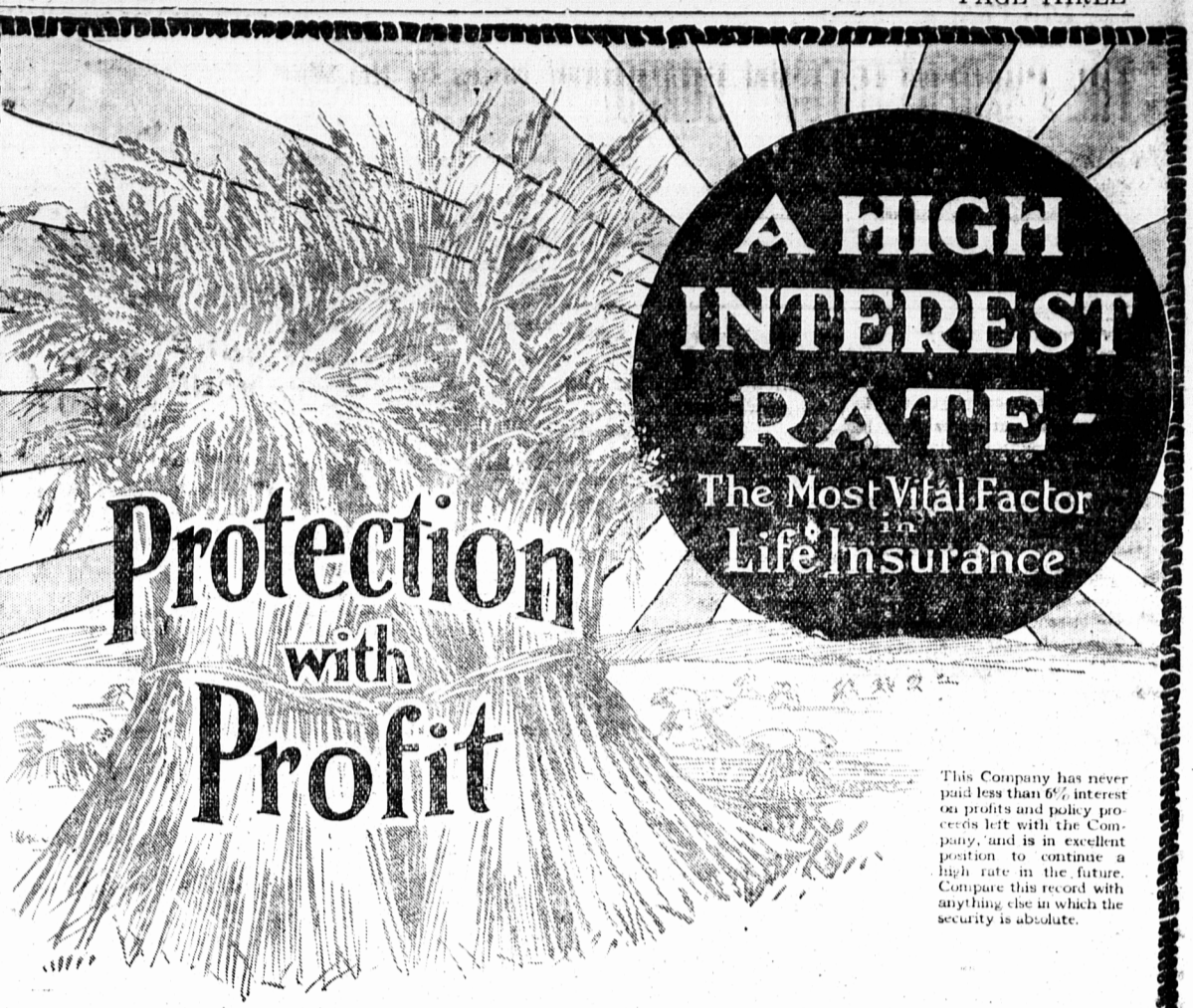
