"WITHIN THE LAW"
"Within the Law" stands forth fairly and squarely as a melodrama and, as such, won the phenomenal theatrical success of recent years. IN MEMORIAM
FRANK WHALEN, BOSTON.
Over 100 members of Local 589, Street Railway Men's Union, acted as escort yesterday at the funeral of Frank Whalen, for 10 years a motor-man on the South Boston division of the Boston Elevated. They were headed by President Thomas Shine and Delegate Charles Clark. His death occurred at the City Hospital, Saturday afternoon, after less than a week's illness from pneumonia. The cortege, at 6:30 o'clock last evening, moved from Gallivan's undertaking rooms, 354 West Broadway, to Dorchester Avenue, where two special electrically heavily draped were boarded by the officers and members of the Carmen's Union. The cortege then continued to the North Station, where the body was placed on the 7:30 train to be taken to New Zealand, Prince Edward Island.—Boston Post, Nov. 1.

SPLENDID CONVENTION IN KING'S COUNTY
(Continued from Page One.)
to carry the banner to victory and if the ballots decided against him, he would make it unanimous.
Mr. Richard Murley, of Murray River, suggested that representatives from each poll be heard from, and that when this was done it might not be necessary to take a ballot. Personally voicing the sentiments of those in his polling division, he felt that justice and fairness, Mr. McIsaac's time for nomination had come.
It was then decided to take the ballot, the result of which was that James McIsaac received 213 votes and John A. McDonald 144.
Mr. John A. McDonald then rose and expressed himself as being glad that Mr. McIsaac was nominated, and moved that nomination be unanimous, which motion was seconded by D. A. Stewart and was unanimously carried.
The President then tendered the nomination to James McIsaac for Mr. McIsaac addressed the delegates, thanking them for their hearty support and also thanking Mr. McDonald for making the nomination unanimous and also stating that if all would stand together the party was sure to win.
Stirring speeches were also made by Hon. Murdoch McKinnon and Dr. A. A. McDonald. Hon. Murdoch McKinnon moved the following resolution, which was unanimously carried:—
Resolved that this Convention of the Liberal-Conservative party of King's County in meeting assembled desire to place on record their absolute confidence in their Leader, the Right Hon. Sir Robert Borden, P.C., G.C.M.G. In this day of great trial for the Empire and Canada we feel that it is very fortunate that we have a leader whose great ability, wisdom and energy are so freely given to the Empire's cause and determination to stand by the Empire and to supply men, money and munitions and in all possible and honourable ways to assist in restoring the freedom of the world and the annihilation of militarism is something that strongly appeals to us and all right thinking and loyal Canadians.
Mr. J. C. Underhay also moved the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:—
Resolved that this Convention desires to bring to the notice of the Federal Government the disadvantages position King's County occupies in the Federal Parliament, Queen's County is represented in the Senate by one Member and by two able and active supporters of the Government in the House of Commons, and Prince County by two Senators, one a very able and active supporter of the Government, while King's County has no representative in the Senate and no supporter of the Government in either branch of parliament, and as a natural consequence many necessary harbours and other improvements of King's County especially in localities where they electors are chiefly Conservative) do not receive the same attention as in the other Counties, wherefore this Convention would respectfully urge the appointment of a Senator from King's County without unnecessary delay to fill the present vacancy in the Senate—believing that the electors of King's County may be trusted to improve the condition in the House of Commons when an opportunity is afforded them.
The meeting was then brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.
There was a very large attendance and it was the best Convention ever held at Georgetown, everything being very quiet and orderly.

How We Catch German Submarines
LIVERPOOL, Nov. 3.—The Daily Post publishes a report of the capture of one of Germany's latest carry-submarines, 250 feet long and carrying in addition to torpedo tubes, four guns of fairly large calibre. The submarine was launched at Stettin a fortnight ago. The Post states that within a few hours after leaving her base she was caught "in one of those traps we have so skillfully laid for these craft somewhere in the North Sea."
A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from a Copenhagen source says: "The German steamer Suoz was sunk by a British submarine yesterday off Karlskrona, in Sweden, on the Baltic. Her crew was landed in Sweden to-day. One of the men was wounded by a shell splinter." Available shipping records contain no steamer Suoz.
A News Agency despatch from Copenhagen says: The German ship Geradina was sunk by a British submarine in the Baltic to-day.

Lt. Col. Ryan Dismissed From Service
LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Official Gazette says Lieutenant-Colonel R. H. Ryan, 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles, has been dismissed from service by sentence of general court martial October 15.
OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—The Minister of Militia was asked to-day as to the reason for the court-martialing in England of Lieut. Col. Ryan, of the Sixth Mounted Rifles. "I have received no official details," he said, "but I heard that Ryan over-indulged a little in France on one occasion. I want to say that he was a particularly fine officer and at Lilliefontaine, in South Africa, he distinguished himself as few men have done."
Lieut. Colonel Robert Ryan was formerly major in the 14th King's Canadian Hussars of Kentville, and was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel in the 6th C. M. R., which was brigaded with the front. Colonel Ryan is a South African veteran having been wounded, mentioned twice in despatches, and having received both the King's and Queen's medal.
