C. I. O. Secretary Is Arrested

TORONTO, Dec. 6—(CP)—Charles H. Millard, 43, secretary of the Congress of Industrial Organizations in Canada, was arrested today on a charge of violating the Defence of Canada Regulations.

The charge is based on statements Millard is alleged to have made during a speech to mine workers at Timmins, Ont., last week.

The section under which he is charged has to do with statements "intended or likely to prejudice recruiting, training, discipline or administration of His Majesty's Forces."

The maximum penalty on summary conviction is a fine of \$500 or 12 months in jail or both. On conviction under indictment, the maximum is a \$5,000 fine or five years in jail, or both.

Provincial Police are said to have obtained a stenographic report of Millard's speech at Timmins. The copy was submitted to attorney general Conant and he ordered the arrest.

Millard was arrested at the offices of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee in downtown Toronto by a squad of Provincial and city police.

Millard became well-known in 1937 as Canadian leader of the C. I. O. in the General Motors strike at Oshawa. At that time he was vice-president of the United Automobile Workers in Canada. Since then he has been engaged in organizing.

Nazi Consulate Secretary Found Battered To Death

NEW YORK, Dec. 6—(AP)—Clad only in a white linen night shirt, Walter Engelberg, 42, a secretary attached to the German Consulate-General here, was found battered to death today in the Brooklyn house he had stored with food and wine to last for a year.

Manuel Martin, a assistant medical examiner, said Engelberg apparently had been attacked in his sleep and hit over the head with a heavy object. Dr. Martin said the ferocity of the blows indicated a crime of vengeance. The weapon was not found.

District attorney William Goeghan asked the police to broadcast an alarm for an unidentified man, described as of small build and wearing a moustache, who had lived with Engelberg.

The secretary's body was found by Fred Doell, another consulate employee, who was sent to Brooklyn by Dr. Hans Borchert, the Consul General, to learn why Engelberg had not reported for work since Monday. Telephone calls to the house had gone unanswered.

Dr. Martin said the secretary had been dead about 24 hours. Blood had soaked through the pillow and mattress.

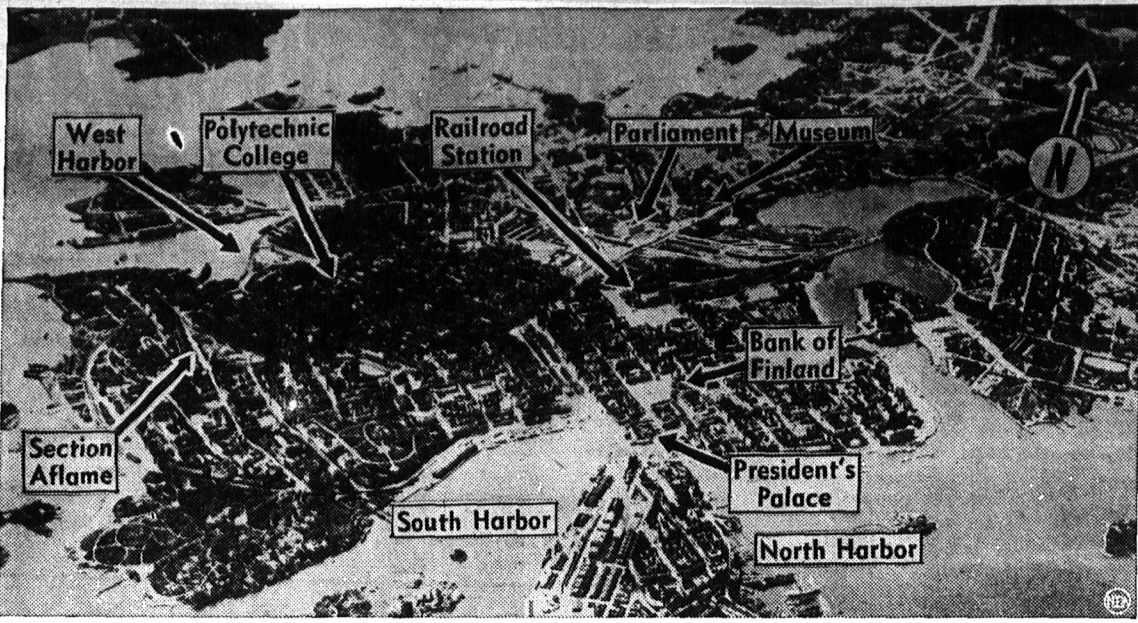

"Let's Keep On Like This" King George's Message

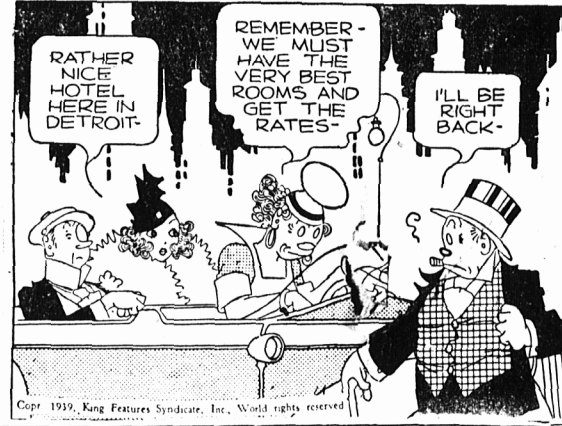

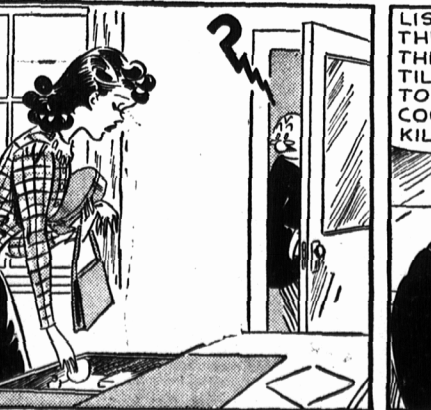

Ontario Issues Debentures

TORONTO, Dec. 6—(CP)—An announcement was made today of an issue of \$12,000,000 Province of Ontario debentures, including \$9,000,000 12-year 3 1/2 per cent debentures being offered at 99.75 and accrued interest to yield over 3.52 percent and \$3,000,000 2 1/2 per cent debentures due March 1, 1944. The debentures will be dated Dec. 1, 1939, and the 1951 maturity will be callable at 100 and accrued interest on or after Dec. 1, 1949, the announcement said. Proceeds of the issues will be "used for general purposes of the Province under the Authorizing Act."
