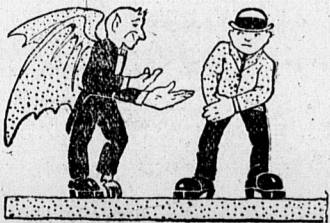

Miss Mary Murray of Halifax who has been spending the past month in the city left last night on return home.

Today is the 51st anniversary of "Cold Friday," which is remarked by the oldest inhabitants as the coldest day in the maritime provinces. The thermometer, while it went to a mark so low as to be unprecedented and unequalled since, was by no means a proper index of the coldness of the day. A high wind, which was forcible enough to break trees in certain sections, heightened the discomforts of the day and a peculiar feature was the low temperature of the preceding day. On the 7th it rained up till evening and the change was as sudden as it was great.

Yesterday morning at eight o'clock the new Chapel in the wing of the Notre Dame Convent, City, was dedicated, Rev. Dr. Morrison, Vernon River, officiating. He was assisted by Dr. Monaghan, as Deacon, Rev. J. McIntyre, sub-Deacon, and Rev. Maurice McDonald, as Master of Ceremonies. There was a very large attendance and the new Chapel was greatly admired and is one of the features of the splendid institution of which it forms a part. In the evening the sermon delivered by Rev. Dr. Morrison was heard by a very large congregation and at the conclusion solemn Benediction was pronounced.

In connection with the voting on Church Union with which the Presbyterian and Methodist congregations in this city are now engaged it is interesting to note the result of a similar vote in St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church, St. John, one of the most important in the St. John Presbytery, where the members last Sunday expressed their opinion by ballot. The Standard of that city says:—The proposed church union between the Methodists and Presbyterians received a hard blow yesterday when the congregation of St. Stephen's Presbyterian church voted against it. The vote stood 182 against and 75 in favor of the proposed union.

A deplorable accident occurred at North Rustico yesterday afternoon about three o'clock. While the little twelve year old daughter of E. J. and Mrs. McKenzie, of that place, was returning from school she fell beneath the feet of a horse as it was passing along the road, was trampled on and run over by the sleigh. The little one was at once driven to her home nearby and medical aid was called in. She was found to be suffering with a broken shoulder, a broken limb and a fractured ankle. Dr. Fleming, who set the broken bones, stated that the child was terribly injured but good hopes are entertained for her ultimate recovery. There was some teaming on the road at the time and in this way the little one's unfortunate mishap was unnoticed until too late. She was resting easily last evening and did not appear to be suffering any great pain.

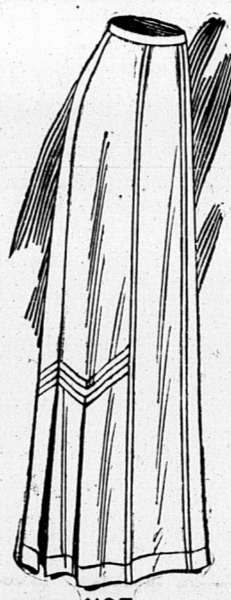
