A 25 Ton Needle

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, Sept. 7.—More than half a million tons of sand, broken rock, and boulders are to be dredged out of Aberdeen Harbour at a cost of \$250,000.

It is a particularly difficult job. The rock has to be broken up under water before it is brought up. This is done by a 25 ton steel needle, which falls from the height of from 18 to 20 feet and smashes

the rock undersea.

The job will employ 100 men for a year, and we estimate that by the end of that time we shall have taken from the bottom of the harbor 300,000 tons of sand and gravel, 150,000 tons of clay, 50,000 tons of broken rock, and 10,000 tons of boulders.

The contracting firm in charge of the work has done many harbours in this country and abroad, and one job, three times bigger than this, was at Holyhead, where 200,000 tons of rock have had to be broken and dredged.
