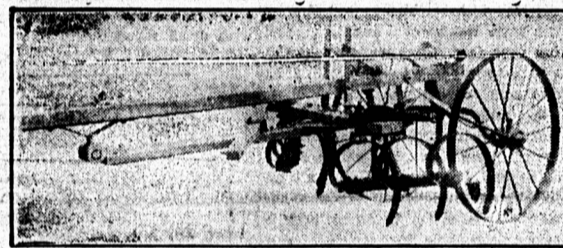

Veteran Runner Captures Classic

Clarence Demar Outruns Field Of 180 In Saturday's Boston Marathon—Canada In Fourth Place.

 BOSTON, Mass., April 19—Clarence Demar, veteran runner of the Melrose Post, American Legion, won his seventh Boston Athletic Association marathon race over a field of 180 here today. Demar, after having surged into the lead at Wellesley Hills, about the half way mark, managed to hold it against the pressure of Karl Koski and Willie Kironen, both of the Finnish American A. C. of New York, and finished in

2 hours, 34 minutes and 48 1-5 seconds. Kyren finished second in 2, 36, 37 4-5 and Koski third in 2, 38, 21 4-5. Harold Webster of the Hamilton Olympic Club, Hamilton Ont., crossed the line fourth in 2, 39, 27 2-5; Garbiel of the North Branch Y. M. C. A., Montreal, fifth in 2, 41, 05; Ronald B. O'Toole of St. John's Nfld., finished sixth in 2, 41, 55 4-5; John D. Semple of West Philadelphia, finished seventh in 2, 44, 23 and Jimmy Henigan of the Hadford A. A., eighth, in 2, 46, 38.
