## Dodgers And Phillies Revolt Highlighted National League Season

 NEW YORK, Oct. 3—(AP)—The mid-season revolt of the Brooklyn Dodgers and Philadelphia Phillies highlighted the United States' second wartime baseball season that ended today, a campaign that some pessimistic persons believed would fold by July 4.

The Flatbush rebellion, which the grapevine blamed on clubhouse second guessing by Manager Leo Durocher, occurred in July and transformed the Dodgers from a pennant contender into a club that was lucky to finish third. The rumpus caused President Branch Rickey to trade pitcher Bobo Newsom

and first baseman Dolph Camilli and led to Durocher's being released from his player-contract on the last day of the season.

The abrupt dismissal of Bucky Harris as manager of the Phillies by William D. Cox, new owner of the Phils, started the Philadelphia flareup. Harris asserted he knew nothing of his dismissal until he received telephone calls from news-papern men asking if he had anything to say on Cox's announcement.

Aroused over what they termed unfair treatment of Harris all of the Phillies players, an hour before a night game in St. Louis, signed a statement saying that they would refuse to take the field unless Cox apologized and reinstated Harris in order to permit him to resign.

This Cox did, adding Harris' dismissal was no reflection on his managerial ability. Freddy Fitzsimmons, Brooklyn pitcher-coach, succeeded Harris, but although the Phils drew more than \$30,000 paid admissions—a record—the club finished seventh after topping the second division for a time.

As for the pennant-winning St. Louis Cardinals and New York Yankees they repeated as most persons expected, despite the loss to the armed services of such stars as Joe DiMaggio, Terry Moore, Enoch Slaughter, Johnny Beazley and Charley Rutzink.

Retailers are now required to reserve a portion of their evaporated milk stocks for priority users who present Evaporated Milk Coupon Cards, or in the case of institutions, a Special Purchase Permit. The remainder of retailers' supplies will continue to be available to the general public without coupons.

HOW TO MAKE APPLICATION AS A PRIORITY USER AT YOUR LOCAL RATION BOARD

FOR INFANTS UNDER 2 YEARS:

Parents, guardians, or other authorized persons must—

- (a) Show medical prescription or doctor's formula,
- or
- (b) Show certificate of need signed by physician, public health nurse, well-baby clinic, or other recognized public health agency,
- or
- (c) Complete and sign a Consumer's Application Form RB-174.

FOR PERSONS 2 YEARS OR OVER:

No evaporated milk coupons will be issued to this group except on presentation of medical certificate or unless Application Form RB-174 is signed by a practising physician.

APPROVED PRIORITY USERS WILL BE ISSUED SPECIAL "G" COUPON CARDS

As priority users will be limited in number, coupons from the regular ration books cannot be used. Special coupons marked "G" will be issued only to approved priority users.

Each card contains a maximum of 16 coupons marked "G". Each coupon is good for the purchase of six 16 ounce cans of evaporated milk—or a total of 96 ounces.

Each coupon card serves for a period of not less than 3 months—and no more than 8 coupons may be used in any one month. Evaporated milk coupons will have no expiry date.

SPECIAL NOTE TO RETAILERS:

As from midnight, October 3rd, all retailers must reserve 25% of their evaporated milk stocks for priority users. During the week of October 4th to 11th they must also reserve an additional 10% to meet sales to consumers who are entitled to Evaporated Milk Coupon Cards but who have not yet had time to obtain them.
