NEWFOUNDLAND HAS AN ELECTION SCANDAL.

The Newfoundland Legislature is easily imagined when it is known shortly to meet and the latest mail from the Ancient Colony brings to hand newspapers supporting the Government of Sir Edward Morris and proclaiming in very big letters the latest scandal against Sir Robert Bond and his party. Briefly summarised the scandal consists of Premier Bond having conducted a considerable correspondence by wire during the election campaign, with his supporters and others and charged these telegrams to the public account. When the Morris Government came in they found that a large number of telegrams were charged to the Government but which were not on file in the departments. They applied to the Post Office Department, which handles telegraph business, for the originals and they were given up, but the messages were in cipher, and Sir Robert Bond on going out of office had taken away the code book. This only served to whet the curiosity of the Morris party and they hunted up another code book, had the messages translated and attested, and also given to the public through the ministerial press. A PATRIOT DISCUSSION IN PARLIAMENT.

OTTAWA, March 30.—History was made in Parliament yesterday when, laying aside all partisan prejudice, Canada's foremost men united to a dignified and highly patriotic discussion regarding this country's position towards Great Britain, and more particularly dealing with the proposed Naval construction. As a result of the discussion, Canada sent to the Motherland an unanimous message of Imperial loyalty and the pregnant announcement that the Dominion stands ready to take its proper place in maintaining the inviolability and integrity of the Empire.

THE AIRSHIP WITH LIFEBOATS AND LIFE PRESERVERS.

The esteemed Patriot it steadily adding to the equipment of his famous airship,—lifeboats, two or more instead of one lifeboat, and cork jackets for the passengers. This adds more weight. The editor also feels assured that "even if the airship did drop perpendicularly on top of the lifeboat the passengers could get away when they saw it coming, and float serenely towards the shore." Did the editor think what would happen to the lifeboat if it dropped fifty or a hundred feet into the water, or worse still if it fell upon a cake of ice? Perhaps The Patriot's editor may also have read Prince Henry's account of the Zeppelin airship in regard to passengers and crew being required to stay exactly in one position to preserve a perfect balance on the ship, that any two persons changing places must rise at exactly the same

time, move at an equal rate and pass exactly in the centre of the boat. Even a passenger rising to his feet from a sitting position may sink the ship downward fifty feet if the person rising is exactly in the middle, or if nearer to one end than the other will proportionately sink that end of the ship and raise the other. A very unstable craft is the Zeppelin airship. Moreover Prince Henry found it could not advance against the wind of more than a certain velocity, is very sensitive to atmospheric changes, passengers are exposed to the weather at all times, and it is almost impossible to carry on conversation owing to the noise of the motors, and so on. Prince Henry is very doubtful whether the airship can be generally useful, even in war, much less as a passenger or mail carrier. But we cannot hope that the minor difficulties above set forth will check the enthusiasm of The Patriot.

THE MONCTON TRANSCRIPT DISCUSSES THE TUNNEL.

The Moncton Transcript in an able and appreciative review of a recent article in the Canadian Courier on the Prince Edward Island Tunnel, characterises the article as "an excellent summary of the arguments in favor of the construction of that work." Briefly, it is urged that the Tunnel is an absolute necessity, that the Island is entitled to it; that the Dominion is in honor bound to build it; that the work can be done for ten millions of dollars and that it will pay the interest on its cost. The Transcript very fairly reviews these contentions one by one, admits their logical force and quotes illustrations and arguments showing how strong the claims of this Province are, on grounds of trade necessity, of the great disabilities under which we labor, the failure of the winter service so far supplied and the strong obligations which are imposed upon the Dominion by the terms of the union compact. All this is fairly and forcibly stated in The Transcript's review. As to the probable cost of the Tunnel the Transcript says: "There is a good deal of misrepresentation of the cost of the Tunnel especially in the Upper Provinces and the West. One leading Upper Canadian newspaper no less than last fall actually estimated the cost of the Tunnel at fifty million dollars. Some individuals who pose as capable of giving the public 'information' respecting the tunnel, in remote parts of the Dominion, have figured the cost of the tunnel as even higher than that. All who know anything about the proposed tunnel are aware of the absurdity of such calculations."

LORD ROSEBERY SUED FOR \$50,000

LONDON, March 29.—The case of Mrs. Andrew Learmont Drysdale, who seeks to recover \$50,000 for alleged slander from Lord Rosebery, to whom he formerly was factor, came up in the Court of Sessions, of Edinburgh, on Saturday.

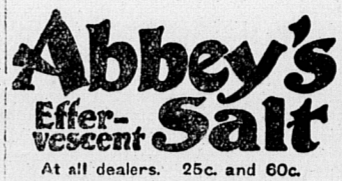
Counsel discussed the question whether there was a case to go before a jury, and Lord Salvesan reserved his decision on the point. It was contended on behalf of Mr. Drysdale that Lord Rosebery, in sending Mr. Drysdale a letter stating that he wished to hold an investigation, and afterwards causing a safe in Mr. Drysdale's office to be broken open and his Lord Rosebery's books, papers and money to be removed, had calumniously represented that Mr. Drysdale had been unfaithful in the discharge of his duty.

Lord Rosebery's counsel denied that there was anything in that method of getting his books and papers to justify an allegation of slander. He contended that an employer was not committing slander by harrying a suspicion of a servant. Counsel for Mr. Drysdale pointed out that his client has been in the service of Lord Rosebery twenty-five years, managing an estate bringing in about \$125,000 yearly. Mr. Drysdale did not question Lord Rosebery's right to get the papers. It was the manner of getting them that he complained of.

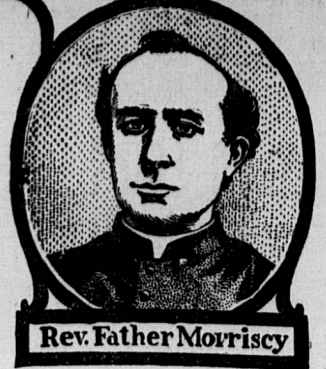
